Missionary Speaker
The Rev. John P. Blalock, Baptist missionary to China, will speak at the First Baptist church, N. 8th and Washington, Sunday, September 23.

The Rev. Mr. Blalock spent five years in China as a missionary, four of them under war conditions. He was imprisoned for more than three years, part of the time at Santo Tomas prison. At Los Banos prison camp the Japs had prepared to shoot all of the prisoners. On that night the American Bangers effected their release. He plans to return to China as quickly as possible to continue his work among the Chinese, and this will probably be his only opportunity to talk in Klamath Falls.

War Casualties Reach 1,071,266

WASHINGTON, Sept. 21 (AP)—U. S. war casualties have reached 1,071,266, or 536 more than a week ago.

Comparative army figures in the latest count are: killed 205,569 and 205,045; wounded 571,698 and 571,608; missing 24,131 and 25,082; prisoners 120,988 and 120,567.

Navy figures: killed 54,008 and 53,809; wounded 80,236 and 79,752; missing 11,107 and 11,262; prisoners 3379 and 3905.

John Quincy Fisher, 79, a resident of Klamath Falls for the past 16 years, died at his home in the Oregon rooms, 631 Main, Thursday evening following a lingering illness.

Mr. Fisher was retired woods foreman of the Fort Smith lumbering company in Arkansas. He is survived by his wife, Mary Effie Fisher, and two daughters, including Mrs. Gladys Magee of this city. Mr. and Mrs. Fisher were operators of the Oregon Rooms. Final rites will be conducted by the Earl Whitlock Funeral Home Saturday at 3 p. m. with interment in Plainville, Ark.

PURCHASER MAY EVICT TENANTS AFTER 3 MONTHS

The new amendment 67 to rent regulations, requiring a six-months waiting period by new purchaser of property before evicting a tenant for own occupancy, will not be effective in this area, Marvin D. Hixon, area rent representative, stated today. The application of the new ruling was optional by the director in each rental area, and it was ruled that the existing three months waiting period is adequate for the Klamath Falls area at this time, Hixon added.

Under the existing regulations in effect in this area, before eviction proceedings can be started, the purchaser must file an affidavit with the area rent office stating that at least 20 per cent of the total purchase price has been paid and that he intends to occupy premises for his own occupancy. If these conditions are met, an eviction certificate will

be granted allowing an eviction after three months from the date of filing with the area rent office, Hixon pointed out. A portion of the down-payment and waiting period requirements will be waived in cases of purchases by returning war veterans.

In all cases of eviction, written notices to the tenants are required and all evictions must be cleared through the area rent office before eviction proceedings can commence. Any questions pertaining to evictions or rent control should be referred to the area rent office, 430 Main, telephone 8817.

ALLIES CAPTURE NAZI 'PROTECTOR'

NUERNBERG, Germany, Sept. 21 (AP)—Konstantin von Neurath, high on the list of German war criminals, was captured Wednesday in Baden Baden, a member of the French delegation said today. He is slated for trial before the international court this fall.

Von Neurath was Hitler's foreign minister before Joachim von Ribbentrop. Then he became "protector" of Bohemia and Moravia. He formerly was president of the secret nazi cabinet council.

Justice Robert H. Jackson, chief U. S. prosecutor, said the Russians had appointed R. Rudenko their special prosecutor and I. T. Nikitchenko the Russian member of the four-nation

panel of judges. Nikitchenko originally had been chosen as Russian prosecutor. Rudenko formerly was Russian protector of the Ukraine.
