

UNIT RECORDS 3105 X-RAYS IN 10 TOWNS

Final reports were completed this week on the recent chest X-ray unit trip through Klamath county.

Ten communities were covered in the county by the large rolling unit and a total of 3105 pictures were taken. Of this number 82 were considered as being positive or questionable and 88 unsatisfactory.

Large X-rays are being taken by the county health department of 270 people who require retakes. The listing of "positive" or "questionable" indicates that the disease may be present while "unsatisfactory" may mean a defective film, the person may have moved, or the machine may not have operated accurately.

40 VETERANS REGISTER AT USES IN MONTH

The situation at the United States employment office remains the same. Positions are available in almost every line of work.

Forty veterans of both world wars have registered this month with Les Finley, veterans employment officer and about half of that number have been placed. This is only about one-third of the veterans returning to this area, Finley said. An equal number have contacted the office as suggested by their release boards, but have not registered, preferring to find their own jobs.

Many Unskilled
Many of those registered wish to wait a few weeks before taking their place again in the business world, some are not able to do general work now, and many are unskilled in any line of business.

For these last, employment officers suggest that they take advantage of vocational educational programs planned for the 1945 fall and winter seasons, and prepare themselves for definite positions.

Offers Service
The army recruiting office in the Federal building is offering attractive re-enlistment service which is expected to absorb some of the discharged veterans who are undecided what to do in civilian life and are untrained in regular trades. Many opportunities are offered to men enlisting for peacetime service. Sgt. William Kleinschmidt, of the recruiting office, stated.

and the horses and the chickens and the pigs practically in the humans' laps. But they are built of brick rather than of stone and most of them have been painted recently, at least within this century. They are well kept up, almost spick and span.

But in one respect the Luxembourg and the French villages are identical. In each the manure pile is the family's most precious possession—the sure mark of economic welfare and the unvarying sign of the good farmer. As in fine old homes in our country and in England at so many parts of the world, the ancestral silver and china are displayed where no eye can miss them. Here, the manure pile is given the place of honor which is directly in front of the front door and removed from its threshold not more than three feet.

BY the evidence of the eye alone, you have no trouble in telling whether you are in France or Luxembourg, for there is a sharp, visible difference. But if you were blind and forced to make the nose pinch-hit for the eye, you'd be puzzled indeed, for the odor of French and Luxembourg villages is identical.

And what an odor it is! It has body and substance. You could measure it with a bushel basket or weigh it on the scales. You could cut it with a knife. It stands up on its hind legs and strides truculently up to you and slams you one in the beeper. Why you can't see it is one of nature's secrets that even the atom smashers haven't pried loose yet.

Why the French and Luxembourg grow their crops solely in the soil is another unfathomable mystery. They'd thrive and burgeon ten feet up in this richly fertilized air.

These requests for information were all received in one day this week and kept Winnifred K. Gillen, home demonstration agent, and her secretary, Elizabeth Ann Jones, busy answering phone calls.

Many of these subjects are explained in bulletins available at the office upon request. Cans for packing food for overseas mailing are supplied at this office also, and foods popular with servicemen appear to be figs, dates, cheese, candy, fruitcake and cookies which may be packed in the cans and sealed right in the office.
