

BPW Club Holds Membership Rally

A large turnout of members and a number of guests attended the first of the season meeting of the Klamath County Business and Professional Women's club on Monday evening, September 17, at the Willard hotel. Places were set for about 75 at dinner.

Inasmuch as the program stressed membership, Isabelle Brixner explained the two-fold purpose of the National Federation of BPW — providing development of leadership in women who are employed, and assisting in the growth and development of their community.

Mrs. Brixner told of the organization of the Alaskan clubs into a federation this past summer, and of the activity of the national federation in the international organization, as 27 nations had active business women's groups before the war. As an example of BPW leadership, she cited Margaret Hickey, the national president, who was one of the few women chosen for advisors at the San Francisco world conference.

Lucile Tweed, international relations chairman, told some interesting facts about business women's groups in European countries, listing various ones, such as Norway, where organization is already under way.

Jean Young, who has just returned from several months spent in Canada, briefly reviewed a talk given in Victoria, B. C., by a vice president of the Great Britain Federation of BPW.

Ellen Upp, vice president, explained the functions of local clubs, the purpose of the executive board, and invited all members to serve on a committee of their choice. Miss Upp listed projects of the Klamath Falls club during the past year, including aid to Girl Scouts and Camp Fire Girls, assisting with the bond drives and at the USO, and raising money for the training of Chinese nurses. A fund of \$16,000 was raised nationally for this purpose in 1943-44.

Mrs. Brixner announced that a southern Oregon conference of BPW will be held at Grants Pass, October 13 and 14, when it is hoped there will be a large attendance from Klamath Falls.

The new president, Hazel Morrison, urging consecutive attendance at meetings, stated that a quiz will be given at the end of the year when a prize will be awarded to the member able to answer the most questions in regard to past meetings.

She also announced that the club's yearbook will go to press in October and those desiring to be included must have their memberships paid by the first of the month. During the evening, Miss Morrison introduced the chairmen of the various committees.

Violet Moore, a teacher at Altamont and well known vocalist, entertained with two numbers, accompanied by Esther Shepherd. Group singing was also enjoyed, led by Winnifred Gillen.

Centerpieces of fall flowers made the dinner tables colorful, and on the speaker's table was an unusually beautiful arrangement of sweet peas. Clever ornaments marked each place. Mr. Perkins stated that it would save many legal entanglements after the death of husband or wife, if people would familiarize themselves with just the ordinary legal procedure of probating estates. The Soroptimists were very appreciative of the time and consideration given the club by Mr. Perkins, and of the information gained from his talk.
