Today's Roundup

IN most controversial matters, there is something to be said on both sides, and to a person constituted as is this writer, it is difficult to see the situation as all black or all white. There is a lot of gray in it.

But in the matter of law enforcement on the Weyerhaeuser mill public road, precipitated into public attention again today, we have no such difficulty. The principles involved are clear and easily defined for everybody.

The sheriff of Klamath county, the governor of Oregon, and the state police have simply stood on the principle that it is the duty of public authorities to maintain law and order, to protect all citizens in their lawful use of the public roads, and to take precautionary measures when there is a danger of violence.

Virgil Burtz, vice president of the CIO International Woodworkers of America, has released a letter to Governor Snell in which he criticizes him for acting on these principles. Mr. Burtz' letter can only be interpreted as a declaration against them. It is an unjust attack, and we are quite certain all responsible citizens will support the governor, the sheriff and the state police for their action in this matter.

It Was Serious

IN his letter to the governor, Mr. Burtz has attempted to minimize the seriousness of the situation which existed on the Weyerhaeuser road, and which prompted a request from Sheriff Low to the governor for state police aid.

This writer was present at the picket line on the occasion of each of the incidents which led to Sheriff Low's request. I was there as a disinterested observer. I say unequivocally that Sheriff Low was fully justified in his action.

I saw Sheriff Low's authority ignored. I saw, and so did others with me, the dangerous potentialities of the situation. To permit it to grow into something worse would have been a palpable dereliction of duty on the part of the authorities, and they acted for the benefit of the CIO as well as the AFL and the public in general.

This writer personally and through this column urged the disputing parties and all others interested to get together on an agreement that would eliminate the dynamite that existed there. It was not done, and precautionary measures by the authorities were absolutely proper and in order.

As Sheriff Low has said, when a road is controlled by persons without legal authority, that such a condition invites others, without legal authority, to attempt to open it. I do not believe the AFL, the CIO, the American Newspaper Publishers association, or anybody else except constituted authorities has a right to take control of a public road. My convictions are as strong on that score as they are that any labor organization has a right to peacefully picket in a labor dispute.

The CIO men were wholly within their rights in posting pickets on the Weyerhaeuser road and seeking, by peaceful persuasion and by the moral force of picketing, to prevent any workman from entering the plant. We complimented them when those methods were used. When more dangerous conditions developed, they could not be ignored by responsible citizens and responsible authorities.

It is again our expressed hope that a full understanding can be reached so that the threat of unlawful trouble and violence may be eliminated, and the precautionary measures taken at the Weyerhaeuser road will no longer be necessary.
