The wedding took place in the First Baptist church, and a lovely reception followed at the home of the bride.

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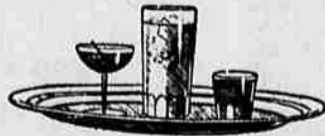
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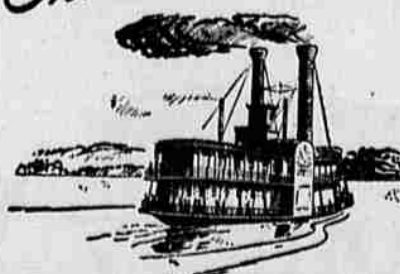
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Bridal Shower
