VANCOUVER, Wash., Sept. 24 (AP)—The Aluminum Company of America revealed today production of ingot aluminum at the company owned plant here has totaled 752,291,000 pounds since the plant was opened five years ago.

Alcoa Works Manager C. S. Thayer reported production statistics have been restricted by "wartime secrecy" and that the output was enough metal for 150,000 fighter type aircraft.

WIFE SLAYER BEGINS LIFE TERM AT PEN

COLUMBIA, S. C., Sept. 24 (AP)—The world he knew has closed behind Lt. Samuel C. Epes, who today changed his name for a convict's number and his uniform for black and white stripes.

After more than six months in the county jail, the 27-year-old son of a wealthy Virginia family settled down to routine in the white-walled state penitentiary, where he will serve a life sentence.

Two avenues of hope lay open for the dashing young medical officer, convicted of drugging and suffocating his school-teacher wife and then burying her in an abandoned foxhole.

One was a new trial, the other an eventual pardon or commutation. A motion for a new trial has already been filed. It will be heard later by Judge A. L. Gaston.

An all-male jury—women do not serve on juries in South Carolina—convicted the handsome

young officer late Saturday after deliberating three hours. Its verdict—guilty of mercy—made a life sentence mandatory. The state, which charged Epes slew his wife because of his love for a 19-year-old Louisiana war plant worker, sought to send him to the electric chair.

Pilot Requirements On River Craft Cut

SEATTLE, Sept. 24 (AP)—Rear Admiral F. A. Zeisler, district coast guard officer, announced today the cancellation of regulations requiring all Columbia river inbound vessels, except fishing craft, to pick up a navy-certified pilot from the pilot boat and all outbound vessels to pick up a pilot at Astoria.

He said the cancellation does not affect other pilotage regulations or laws, nor the regulations governing the restricted area at the river entrance, prohibiting vessels from anchoring or fishing there.

Man Killed In Street Shooting

YAKIMA, Sept. 24 (AP)—Amado Cardenas was jailed without charge yesterday after a midnight street shooting at Wapato in which one man died, Deputy Sheriff Bert Guns said.

The dead man was Sylvester Juarez. Guns said five high school students told him they saw Juarez and Cardenas get out of a car and meet in front of it. He quoted the students as saying three shots were fired into Juarez's body and that he was then beaten over the head with the pistol.

Wapato Policemen Harold Conway and Claude Nesary, called to the scene, said they found Cardenas seated in the front seat of the car and Mrs. Juarez weeping in the back seat.

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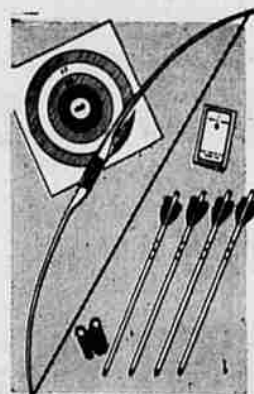
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
