

# Bengals, Cubs Hold Loop Leads

**Binks' Boner May Cost Nats American Loop Lead; Brains Cardinals Triumph**

Should the Washington Senators fall to win the American league pennant by a single game, the name of George (Bingo) Binks may go down in baseball history books alongside such celebrated ones as Fred Merkle, Fred Snodgrass, Heinie Zimmerman and Mickey Owen, who cost their respective clubs a world series.

**No Sun Glasses**  
It was Outfielder Binks' failure to equip himself with sun glasses that cost the Nats a chance for a clean sweep of yesterday's doubleheader with the Athletics and a virtual tie for first place with Detroit's league leading Tigers, who were beaten by the St. Louis Browns.

The overnight enabled Philadelphia to win the opener 4-3 in 12 innings, the identical score by which the Senators copped the nightcap which was limited to eight innings by darkness.

The split left the Senators one full game behind the Bengals, and three lengths back in the league column. The Senators can't do anything about it in their own behalf as their regular schedule ended Sunday. It left Washington in a spot where Detroit now needs to win only two of its four remaining contests to cop the flag, in which case the final standings would be:

The Tigers open a two-game stand against Cleveland Tuesday and then jump to St. Louis for a pair on Saturday and Sunday.

**Binks' Boner**  
Binks' boner came in the 12th with the score tied 3-3. At the start of the inning, the sun, which had been hiding in a murky sky all day, came out while Washington was at bat. Outfielder Sam Chapman of Philadelphia stopped the game and called for his dark glasses. However, when Washington took the field, Binks left his glasses on the bench.

Walter Masterson, second baseman, quickly got two men out and Ernie Kish's high fly to center should have returned the side. But Binks lost the ball in the sun and it fell for a double. After Dick Siebert was purposely passed, George Kell stroked the payoff poke, a single to right which sent Kish over the plate with the winning run.

Washington tagged no-hit Dick Fowler for three runs in the third inning of the nightcap. After the A's again came from far back to tie the game. Washington won it in the eighth on successive doubles by George Case and George Myatt. After Pieretti, celebrating his 24th birthday, was the winning hurler.

The Tigers were tamed by Nelson Potter, veteran St. Louis righthander, who handcuffed them with two safeties in registering a 5-0 shutout for his eighth straight victory and his 15th of the season.

**Cubs Protect Lead**  
The National league flag chase remained unchanged as the Chicago and St. Louis won. The Cubs protected their game and a half advantage by trimming the Pittsburgh Pirates 7-3 in the opener of a scheduled twin-bill. The second game was washed out by a thundershower, necessitating a doubleheader today. Andy Pafko was the big gun for Chicago, his grand slam homer in the third inning climaxing a six-run frame. For Hank Wyse it was number 21 this season.

The Cards continued to hound the Cubs by battering four Cincinnati hurlers for 12 hits including a home run by Whitey Kurowski, to whip the Reds 9-6. Marty Marion, celebrating the day set aside in his honor as the National league's most valuable player, stroked a double during a three-run fifth inning to drive in two mates.

# PCL Finishes 1945 Season

The Pacific Coast League slid past the finish wire Sunday in an anti-climactical finale that saw Portland, Seattle, Sacramento and San Francisco wind up in that order for the Governor's Cup playoff series which opens tomorrow.

End of the season also will mark the passing of many a creaking veteran and jazz-checked rookie from the circuit. The eight clubs, operating under wartime manpower handicaps, fielded lineups that included a liberal sprinkling of youngsters and resurrected old-timers. But with the return of dozens of veterans from the service few of the emergency replacements are expected to make the grade next year.

Playoff semi-finals will get underway at Portland tomorrow night with the Champion Beavers entertaining the Seattle Rainiers. Single games will be played there Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, with the series being resumed in Seattle Saturday unless one of the clubs wins all three at Portland. In that event there will be no games until Sunday afternoon.

**Wildcats Outweighed**

# Webfoot Hopes Now High With Return Of Great Back

Five untested and green northern division football squads go into their final week of practice today in preparation for the season's openers Saturday which will find Oregon playing Washington and Idaho tangling with Washington State.

Oregon State will warm up against Camp Beale. **Leicht Returns**  
Biggest piece of news in the division is the return to Oregon after an army discharge of Half-back Jake Leicht, regarded by many, including Oregon's Coach Tex Oliver, as the greatest collegiate back in the nation.

On the strength of Mr. Leicht's imminent arrival Duck hopes are bouncing along on a wave of optimism including visions of a coast title and the Rose Bowl. While one back won't make a ball club it may turn out that the tested talents of Mr. Leicht may tip the scales in a league where inexperience is the rule.

In 1941 Coach Oliver saw Leicht at work in practice and immediately saw the Webfoots in the Rose Bowl—but the army came and Leicht went—to perform very creditably with the Randolph Field Ramblers and the Fourth Air Force Flyers.

**Triple-Threat Man**  
Against Leicht's admitted triple-threat strength Coach Ralph Welch of Washington can stack Fullback Bobo Moore, hard running back surely not softened any by a hitch in the marines, and Don Rochon who was a standout against bigger schools with Willamette last year.

Other husky veterans—are linemen—Bill McGovern, center, and Fred Osterhout, guard. Freshmen will fill the gaps, with Norm Sansregret and Joe Stone, both promising, the most probably running mates for Moore and Rochon.

To hold the Husky backs in check Saturday, Oliver has another ace in the hole in the person of Elliott Wilson, 225-pound, 6 foot, five inch center, a letterman from the 1940-41 squads.

Wilson just has been discharged from the marines after action in the South Pacific and reported on the Oregon campus Saturday.

The first lot of ROTC students reported on the University of Idaho campus Saturday and among them Coach Babe Brown recruited a pair of versatile linemen.

They are Bill Last, 190-pounder, who played center for Oshkosh Teachers college, and Dave Vance, rangy, 175 pound Coloradoan who can play either center or end.

**Gaels Upset Bears, 20-13**  
BERKELEY, Calif., Sept. 24 (AP)—A colorful, flashy band of Galloping Gaels from St. Mary's is being watched with new respect this week after providing the coast's first major football upset in defeating the University of California Bears 20-13 Saturday.

Two fleet-footed "scat backs," both from Hawaii, literally ran Coach L. T. "Buck" Shaw's heavier crew dizzy with a combination of razzle-dazzle reverses and unerring passes.

Herman Wedemeyer, left half, and his Honolulu teammate, Charles "Spike" Cordeiro, right half, sparked the red-shirted Gaels to three touchdowns and were instrumental in manufacturing two others that were nullified by penalties.

**Shotgun Shells To Stay Scarce**  
WASHINGTON, Sept. 24 (AP) Shotgun shells will continue in short supply until after the peak of the hunting season this fall.

Manufacturers are making shells in increased volume because of greater lead allotments, but can't get them to market in time to fire at this year's ducks.

But by December 1, a war production board official predicted today, supplies will be approaching normal. Current supplies are only about half normal requirements.
