HEATING COMPANY DEPOSIT PLAN TOLD

A consumers' deposit plan was presented to some 40 customers of the Klamath Heating company at a meeting held in the circuit court rooms Friday night by John W. Kirby, company president.

Under this plan, which will loan to the company approximately \$80,000, consumers will advance heating bills six months, this money to be returned at five per cent interest, over a period of two years on a 1/24th of the total amount advanced.

Money Needed
Kirby explained that money was needed to install a new boiler and other facilities and to pay back taxes. The proposition, as explained Friday night, will be mailed to all consumers and if approved, submitted to the public utilities commissioner at Salem. If the commissioner approves, the plan will go into effect immediately.

Kirby had previously advised that "unless such a program can be inaugurated immediately maintenance of adequate and dependable heating service will be seriously jeopardized."

Company Abandons Test Oil Well

CLATSkanie, Sept. 25 (AP)—The test oil well drilled near here by the Texas company has been abandoned and another well is being drilled between Tigard and Hillsboro, the company reported today.

Officials said they were not satisfied with the Clatskanie well. At the 5550 depth there was "no showing of oil." The company, which has about 100,000 acres of Columbia county public land under lease and an unknown acreage of private property said its second test well would be known as Cooper Mountain No. 1.

KF SERGEANT WAS PRISONER OF NAZIS

SANTA MONICA, Calif.—When he bombed Frankfurt on February 11, 1944, S/Sgt. Joe R. Richey, B-17 gunner from Klamath Falls, had no idea that two weeks later he would be a prisoner in a Frankfurt reception center.

That mission, Richey's sixth, ended in disaster. When the damaged plane was attacked by 10 FW-190's, Richey and the waist gunner accounted for two before the crew bailed out in German territory and were taken prisoner.

Richey, who had had an index finger shot off as well as shrapnel wounds in head and shoulders, was sent to a German hospital. After the hospital was bombed by Germans, Richey went to Frankfurt reception center and was transferred then to a German prison. Ten of the 20 months Richey spent overseas were spent in a German prison. He wears the Air Medal, Richey's parents, Mr. and Mrs. James L. Richey, live in Roseburg. His wife, Virginia, lives at 115 N. 10th, Klamath Falls.

Truman Support Of CVA Assured

WASHINGTON, Sept. 25 (AP)—Senator Mitchell and Rep. Jackson, Washington democrats, said they received assurances today from President Truman of his continued support of a projected Columbia valley authority.

They told reporters after a White House visit the president suggested changes in Mitchell's CVA bill to make it conform more completely with the Tennessee valley authority act.
