

FUNDS SET FOR STATE MENTAL INSTITUTIONS

SALEM, Sept. 26 (AP)—The state board of control, acting under instructions from the state emergency board, said today it would call for bids in a few weeks on three buildings, to cost \$1,243,000, at mental institutions in Salem.

The buildings are the most urgently needed in the state's \$10,000,000 building program.

This program received the general approval yesterday of the emergency board, although actual construction might be delayed as much as several years. The board of control hopes to take advantage of lower building costs and to wait until the program is needed to help the expected unemployment problem.

Building Costs

Calling for bids on the three buildings would give the board an idea on building costs. If they are too high, construction of the three structures would be delayed and the bids rejected. Presumably, the emergency board would have to meet again to approve actual construction of the three buildings.

The three buildings are a ward building at the state hospital's cottage farm, to house 360 patients and cost \$325,000; a 300-bed treatment hospital at the state hospital, to cost \$800,000; and a \$118,000 cottage for patients at the state Fairview home for feeble-minded persons.

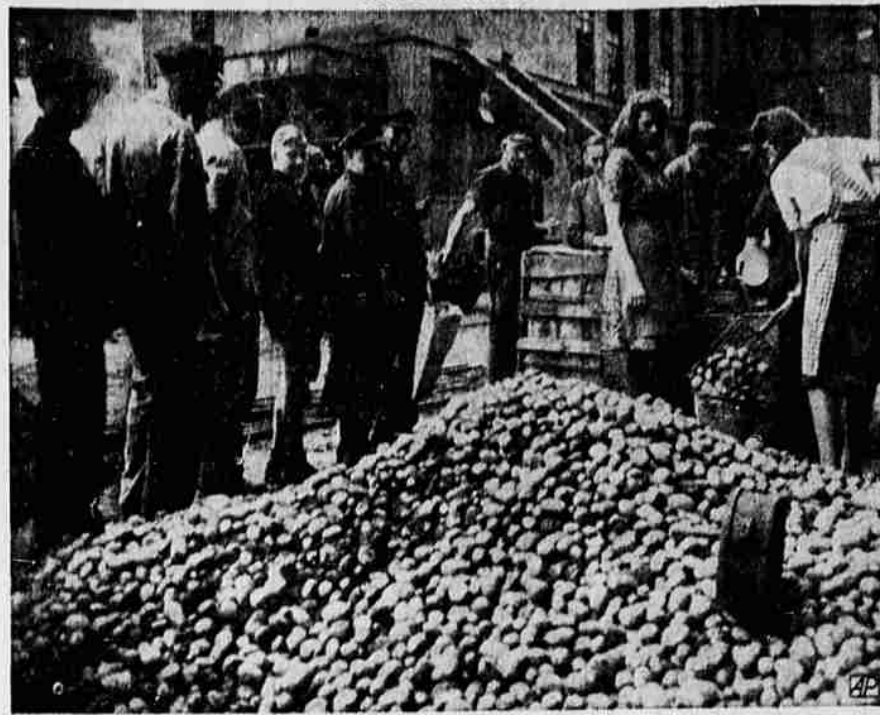

VICTIM OF AUTO ACCIDENT IMPROVES

TULELAKE—Don Schreiber, 16-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Albert Schreiber who was critically injured two weeks ago in an automobile accident, is improving, according to his father who returned here Monday after being at the bedside of his son. Mrs. Schreiber remained in Portland until such time as Don can be returned here.

Riding in the back of a pickup truck, young Schreiber, with a second occupant, was thrown from the vehicle when it was stopped suddenly by a third youth who was driving. It was first reported by the boys involved that the three had been riding in a sedan and Schreiber was thrown to the pavement when a door flew open. He had been visiting friends in Portland, both adult hosts being employed. Neither was at home when the accident happened and the other boys involved, frightened at his condition, took him home, placed him in bed and left without informing anyone of his injury. It developed when he was found several hours later that he had suffered a skull fracture. His condition was critical for several days.

Klamath Union high was sorrowed by the death of one of the faculty yesterday. Clyde C. Roberts, who taught physics, algebra and coached Wildcat football at KUHS, died yesterday morning at the Marine Barracks after an illness of several weeks. Mr. Roberts was a graduate of Annapolis and had recently been released from the marine corps where he held the rank of major. After his discharge he applied for a position at KUHS and had taught for only a week and a half when he became ill.

K Club

At a recent meeting of the K club the members decided upon some rules about the wearing of letter sweaters. No boy attending KUHS is entitled to wear a stripe on a K sweater until he has earned a letter in some field of sports at KUHS. No one but a senior boy who has earned two stripes may wear a white letter sweater. Hi-Y Helps on Survey

The Hi-Y has been doing its bit for the survey conducted by Dr. Riggs of Willamette university. The survey includes the recreational needs of the city. At its conclusion it will be decided whether or not it is advisable for there to be a YMCA and YWCA here.

The Hi-Y is helping with several phases of the survey. They are preparing a map of the recreational and educational centers of the city, including churches. One committee is listing all the churches and designating those that have a gym or have play space. Still another group is listing teams and leagues and playgrounds available around town. "ROBOT NEWS BOY"

NEW YORK, Sept. 26 (AP)—A "robot news boy" will have its first public test next week in a subway station. The robot, a vending machine, dispenses up to 200 papers and gives change for a nickel. Designed by Samuel Leschin, it is said to be virtually foolproof, and scrupulous in its rejection of wrong coins and slugs.

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
