AGENCY SEES PLANNING LACK IN NORTHWEST

WASHINGTON, Sept. 26 (AP)—The federal works agency has concluded northwestern communities are lagging in their public works planning. Reporting on the use of interest-free federal planning loans, FWA said in a letter to Senator Morse (R-Ore.) the offer of government funds has received "less consideration in the northwest than in any other section."

Montana has submitted the most projects, 16. Idaho has made no applications. There have been eight from Washington state, seven from Oregon, five from Alaska.

For Oregon—Tillamook Power & Light improvements, \$610,000, for which \$13,000 has been advanced for planning; Beaverton, high school addition, \$250,000, planning \$8800; Portland, Hawthorne viaduct, \$1,677,552 and \$21,730; Portland, Morrison viaduct, \$1,555,790 and \$22,830; Oregon City school No. 62, \$276,000 and \$8800; same, \$45,980 and \$1720; same, \$149,370 and \$4880.

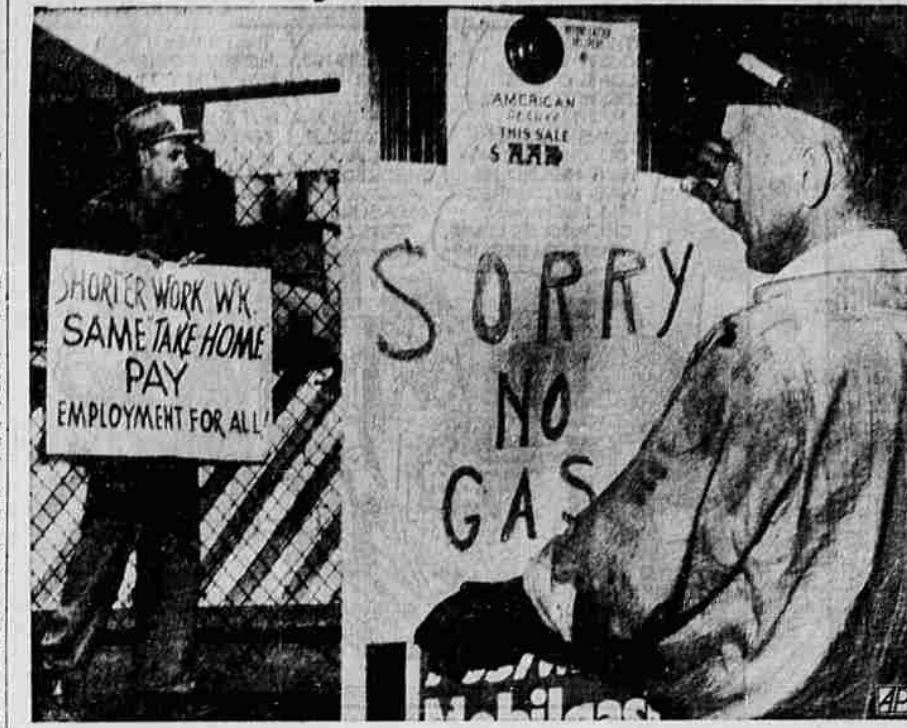
LONG FIRST JUMP

3rd Fought On Every Front In Europe

On VE-Day the third infantry division was at Salzburg, and was using as a mess hall the dining room of the Schloss Klessheim, where Hitler once housed his more important guests.

But the doughboys of the third had walked a long and bloody trail to reach Salzburg. This division, which earned the nickname "Rock of the Marne" because of its impregnable stand in World War I, is the only American division which fought the nazis on every front in Europe—North Africa, Sicily, Italy, France and Germany. It had more casualties—nearly 35,000—than any other division, and it holds the record for high combat citations, more than 29 of its officers and men having won the Medal of Honor.

The third's first D-Day came in 1942, when it spearheaded the landing near Casablanca. The division's capture of Palermo, after a D-Day landing in Sicily, was sensational.

When the Anzio campaign was launched, the third again drew the "short straw". Its men slashed ashore in the first wave, and it was here that the third established the record for the most casualties suffered in any one day. In its first 24 hours on French soil the division took more than 1000 prisoners. It raced to Avignon and the Rhone river, and breached the Vosges line. Then, as a major unit in the seventh army, the third drove across the Rhine and deep into Germany.

Portland Council Authorizes Suit

PORTLAND, Sept. 26 (AP)—A legal suit to force the Portland Traction company to set aside net profits of \$4,282,919 to modernize the city transportation system has been authorized by the city council.

The council voted yesterday to ask the court to impound the company's net profit, because under franchise terms it must invest 75 per cent of profits in new equipment. The company had planned to distribute \$875,000 of its profits to stockholders under a proposal now before a federal court.

TO PLAN COURSE
GEARHART, Sept. 26 (AP)—About 100 delegates will meet here tomorrow and Friday to plan a postwar course for the Oregon Association of Hospitalists. C. O. Moberg, association president, will preside. Dr. Charles N. Holman, medical director of the University of Oregon medical school, will outline the proposed survey of Oregon hospitals.

QUAY DOCK PLANNED

PORTLAND, Sept. 26 (AP)—The commission of public docks has instructed its engineers to prepare plans for a three-ship capacity quay dock for construction within the next year. The commission also joined the Portland chamber of commerce in its campaign for a civil aeronautics board decision favoring an airline from the northwest to the Orient by way of Alaska.

WASHINGTON CO-ED TELLS OF CAPTURE

SPOKANE, Sept. 26 (AP)—A 20-year-old Washington State college coed and beauty contest winner told authorities last night she had been held captive Monday night and Tuesday by two men who struck her over the head as she was returning home from visiting a friend.

Mrs. Carl Bergquist, the former Janet Harrison of Longview, said two men wearing dark overcoats hit her with a heavy object, put a hood over her head and drove her to a root cellar. They intended to hold her there for ransom, she told police, but late yesterday took her downtown and released her.

Treated for shock and a head injury at Emergency hospital, Mrs. Bergquist said the men did not otherwise molest her.

She is a senior at Washington State and has been doing practice teaching at Lewis and Clark high school in Spokane. Her husband, Dr. Carl Bergquist, is a Spokane veterinarian.

Cook Questioned In Stabbing Case

THE DALLES, Sept. 26 (AP)—Luke J. Singleton, 57, cook at the Warm Springs lumber camp, was held in jail today for questioning in the stabbing of Franklin C. Brooks, 49, with a butcher knife.

Brooks, reported in serious condition in the Warm Springs Indian agency hospital, suffered abdominal wounds when attacked at the Indian reservation logging camp. Bert Ferguson and Guy Angell were held as material witnesses.

Truman Would Welcome Alaska

WASHINGTON, Sept. 26 (AP)—President Truman said today he would welcome Alaska's entry into the union as a state.

Told at his news conference that Interior Secretary Ickes recently came out in favor of statehood for Alaska, the president said that he had not gone into the question thoroughly of late.
