

POPULATION OF JAP CENTER AT TULELAKE CUT

TULELAKE—The Japanese population of the segregation center at Newell has dropped below 17,000, following departure this week of 51 residents to locations outside the center. Present figures show that 16,978 remain. Tulelake remains by far the largest of the nine centers, according to figures released by Michael Primm, head of the statistics department, with Poston, Ariz., center second with 5542.

Gila has 4370 remaining; Heart Mountain, 4300; Manzanar, 3123; Topaz, 2839; Rohwer, 2711; Granada, 2704 and Minidoka, 2700. All centers except Tulelake are to be closed by October 1.

Temporary Quarters
Quarters for Japanese-Americans leaving the centers are being provided temporarily in or near San Francisco until such time as the relocating Japanese can find permanent homes. Space for 50 families and 200 single persons has been provided near Fort Funston in quarters formerly occupied by the coast artillery. Another group, all war veterans and their families, will be housed in units vacated by civilian shipyard workers.

Plan Requested
The San Francisco housing authority, in disclosing the plan which has been explained to residents of the project here, said it "is a stop gap measure requested by the federal public housing authority and the WRA."

It is expected that other areas formerly used by the army will be made available on the Pacific coast for use by the Japanese since the army has offered the fullest cooperation in resettling the loyal Nisei.

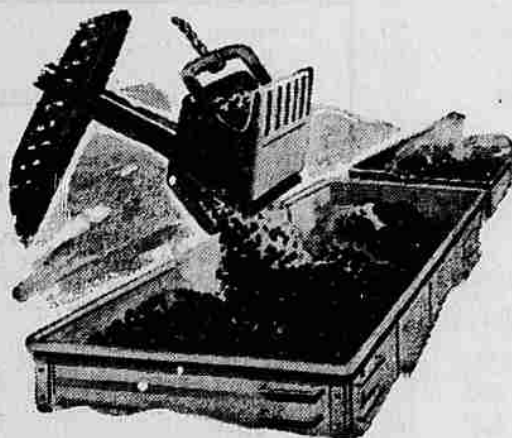
