

BOY SCOUT SET NEW RECORD IN ATTENDANCE

Boy Scout camp attendance broke all former records this past summer with 452 Scouts enrolled, according to Robert H. Lamont, scout executive, in a report made public this week. Twenty-eight troops attended camp from all over the 50,000 square miles included in this council. Scouts came to the camp from as far as Canby, Calif., and Prineville, Ore.

Some 9952 individual meals were served in the camp and several meals each week were cooked by the Scouts in outpost camps or on Scouting projects.

Highlighting the past summer's program was the water front program under the direction of Marine Corporal Thomas E. Sundstrom. Many merit badges in swimming, life-saving, canoeing and rowing were passed in the new waterfront area. This area is roped off on the sides of floats constructed of heavy platforms built on to liberty ship life rafts as pontoons. The construction was done in the early summer and was ready when camp opened on July 15.

Another program feature was the outpost hiking and camping and scouting lore under the direction of Harold I. Talley, assistant executive. Each week the majority of the Scouts went on an outpost hike, remaining overnight and hiking to one of the mountain peaks on the following day. Diamond peak was ascended by five parties during the summer and Cowhorn peak was climbed by three parties.

Flag Planting
On V-J Day, a party of 16 Scouts stood on the summit of Diamond peak, planted a flag that they had carried on the hike and sang "The Star Spangled Banner" in commemoration of the day.

Fifteen leaders came to camp this year with their own troops, another all-time record for the camp. Local men who attended were Harold B. Ashley, Gary Price, William Van Cleave, George Dow, Sam Hodges, Rev. Phelan, John Weber, Crawford Lewis and Rev. Johnson.

The only negative reports from the camp were that existing facilities were inadequate for the Scouts who attended and plans are being carried forward to prepare for an even bigger attendance next year.

CEILING PRICES ON PEARS REMAIN SAME

WASHINGTON, Sept. 28 (AP) — The OPA announced yesterday retail and shipping point ceiling prices for fresh pears of the 1945 crop will be about the same as last year.

FOB shipping point ceilings in Washington and Oregon, where the standard western box weighs 47 pounds, begin at \$3.52 and increase to \$4.48. The new regulation also provides for establishing ceilings for pears in standard containers on the basis of volume rather than weight.

The ceiling for a northwestern bushel container or its equivalent is derived by multiplying the average weight, 47 pounds, by 7.5 cents, the per pound price.

OPA also announced that the Oregon counties of Josephine and Jackson, which last year were in the California zone, have been placed this year in the Washington and Oregon zone.

PWS SABOTAGED JAP TOKYO EQUIPMENT

ASTORIA, Sept. 28 (AP) — Yank prisoners working in the industrial areas of Tokyo and Yokohama became clever at destroying enemy equipment without being caught, a Cottage Grove navy man said here.

Sabotage included punching holes in oil cans, taking vital parts from machinery, dropping castings and filling gear boxes with emery dust, reported Chief Radioman Joe R. Young in the Astoria naval hospital.

Young, who lost weight and most of his teeth during three and a half years as prisoner, declared he was luckier than most. "We were working on the railroad most of the time and could steal them blind when they shipped food," he said. He has a wife and two children in Cottage Grove.
