

MASS MURDERS OF MEXICANS INVESTIGATED

LAREDO, Tex., Sept. 29 (AP)—Mexican officials were making a thorough investigation for more evidence today in the vicinity of Reynosa and Matamoros, Mex., while questioning individually 28 men held at Nuevo Laredo and charged with the wholesale murder of 37 men and one woman.

The 28, all Mexican nationals, were arrested in or near Reynosa and Matamoros, cities on the Mexican side of the lower Rio Grande valley. They were taken to Monterrey, then brought to Nuevo Laredo yesterday.

Smuggling Charge
They have been charged with smuggling their 38 countrymen into the United States for farm work, robbing them of their wages, killing them as they returned to Mexico, and throwing the bodies into the Rio Grande.

The accused were held incommunicado in Nuevo Laredo jail on orders of Prosecutor Emilio Villalobos of Nuevo Laredo.

Killing Charge
The 27 were charged with killing the returning workers during the latter part of July and August at points between border towns of Brownsville, Mission, and Hidalgo, Tex., and Reynosa, Mex., Villalobos said.

Mexican officials said 19 bodies were recovered from the Rio Grande near Brownsville, 13 near Hidalgo, and six near Mission. One victim was a woman whose hands and feet had been gashed.

One of the victims was Maj. William R. McKinley, 26, of Page, Idaho. His widow, Mrs. Phyllis W. McKinley, now resides in Boise. Also killed was 1st Lt. Benjamin M. Huffman, 26, whose widow, Mrs. Bette A. Huffman lives at Wichita, Kas.

Three men were injured, though none seriously.

'Famous Fourth' Cleared Paris

When the Fourth Infantry Division came home it brought two war souvenirs for the people of New York from the people of Paris—a section of the Iron Gate that bounds the



Tuileries Gardens, and a scarred cornice stone from the Hotel Crillon. The "Famous Fourth" was selected to bear these gifts, because, while the citizens of Paris crouched behind the Tuileries gate waiting for liberation, it was the men of the IV division who drove in and crushed the last German defender.

The Fourth has another distinction. On D-Day, the 8th Infantry, one of the three regiments of the Fourth, swept ashore at Utah beach and earned the honor of being the first unit among all the invasion forces to touch the coast of Normandy. Three unit citations were given to elements of the Fourth for their heroic work in Normandy.

One of the Fourth's first tasks after reaching Normandy was to effect an escape route for isolated units of the 82nd Airborne Division who had parachuted into France and been cut off at Ste. Mere Eglise. The Fourth fought for the freedom of Cherbourg, and swung back to St. Lo where it aided in the breakthrough by riding through enemy lines clinging to tanks of the Second Armored Division.

By VE-Day, the Fourth had reached the Austrian border, and had suffered 21,550 casualties.

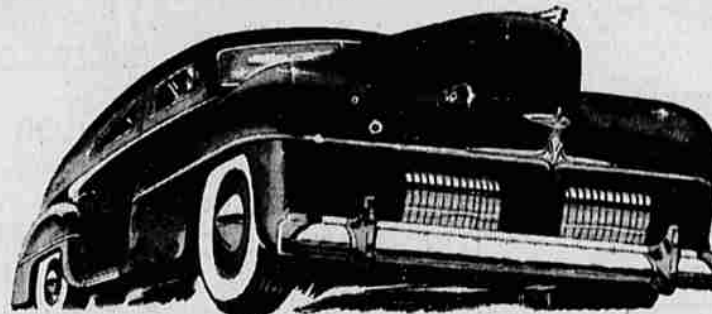

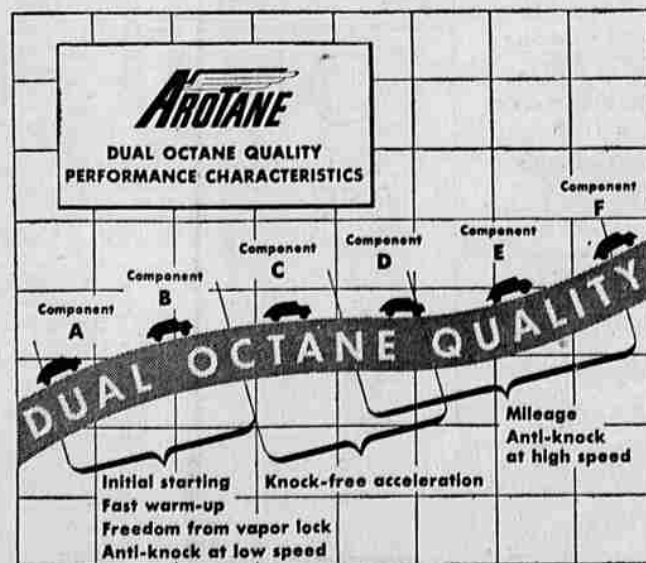
