

## Klamath Eleven Crushes Vikings By 38-7 Score

Edwards, Redkey, DeVore Spark K-Men To First Gridiron Victory Of Season

After a scoreless first quarter the Klamath Pelicans turned on a powerful and dazzling running attack last night at Modoc field to crush the Salem Vikings 38 to 7.

Sparked by Tommy Edwards and Bob Redkey the Klamath eleven scored three times in the second stanza, twice in the third period and once in the final quarter.

Lone Touchdown

Salem's lone touchdown came in the third period on an 11-yard aerial thrust from Roger Dasch to Al Chamberlain.

The two teams battled through the first period on even terms, although the Pelicans muffed a chance for a touchdown in the late minutes of the first quarter after they had driven to the Salem nine-yard line.

The drive started from the Salem 47 when Edwards reeled off 22 yards for a first down on the 25. Barker stormed over guard for 15 more yards and another first down on the Salem 10. Edwards picked up one but on the next play Coleman fumbled and Edwards recovered for a nine yard loss. Two passes fell incomplete and the Vikings took over on their own 18.

The Pelicans threatened again at the beginning of the second period but were halted on the Salem eight yard line.

First Blood

Klamath drew first blood after Edwards swivel-kipped his way 16 yards to a first down on the Salem 20. Six plays later Redkey boomed through the middle of the line for the first touchdown of the game. Coleman's dropkick for the extra point was wide.

The Pelicans struck pay-dirt again before the crowd of 3000 people had settled back in its seats.

Redkey kicked off to Allison who fumbled and Redkey recovered on the Salem 27 and Redkey and Edwards made it a first down on the 17. Edwards, 15-year-old sophomore fullback, blasted his way 15 yards to the Salem two and crashed over on the next play. Coleman's kick for the extra point split the uprights to put the Pelicans out in front 13 to 0.

Salem Fumble Recovered

Once on the march the Klamath eleven was unstoppable and the third touchdown was set up when Cobb fumbled and Harold Wirth recovered on the Salem 27.

Ben DeVore slammed through the middle for a first down on the 17 and then added seven more to put the pill on the 10 yard line. From there Redkey bulled over right guard for the score and Coleman converted the extra point with a dropkick.

The third period was barely underway until the Vikings were forced to punt and Redkey took Hoar's kick and weaved 31 yards into the end zone for the fourth Klamath touchdown. Not a hand was laid upon him as the Pelican left half scampered through the entire Salem team. Coleman's dropkick was short of the goal posts.

Salem Scores

The Vikings saved themselves from a whitewashing in the third quarter by scoring on a forward pass. DeVore kicked out of bounds on the Klamath 29 and Dasch flipped a pass to Bellinger good for 18 yards and a first down on the 11. On the next play Dasch faded back and rifled a pass to Chamberlain for the only Salem touchdown. Dasch sneaked over guard for the conversion to make the score 26 to 7.

The Klamath second string showed that it could play foot-ball, too, immediately after Salem scored. Mac VanMeter, who had replaced Coleman at quarterback, uncorked an aerial to Ray Craig good for 22 yards to the Viking 36. He then cocked his wing and heaved a beautiful pass to Jim Pope who made a sensational catch, fought off two tacklers on the five, and went over standing up. VanMeter's pass for the extra point failed.

The final Klamath touchdown came midway through the fourth quarter when Coleman started things rolling by snagging a Salem pass and carrying the ball to the Pelican 49.

Barker Goes Over

After an exchange of penalties Coleman tossed a pass to Dee Nelson who was nailed on the Salem 33. Redkey picked up nine yards and Edwards shot through the middle of the line, shook off three tacklers, and went to the six before being downed. Herbert Barker, Pelican right halfback, then wrote his name in the scoring ledger by driving over tackle for the final touchdown of the game. Coleman's attempted dropkick

was no good and the score remained 38 to 7.

The K-men completely outplayed their hapless opponents throughout the entire game, rolling up a total yardage of 306 yards while the Vikings were held to 110.

Klamath amassed 12 first downs against Salem's seven but suffered a total loss of 80 yards from penalties while the Vikings were set back only 30 yards.

Outstanding

In the Klamath backfield Edwards, Redkey and DeVore were outstanding and Wirth and Vanderhoff did fine work in the line. Scott Reed, reserve tackle, turned in a nice ball game while he was in there by opening gigantic holes in the Salem forward wall.

Roger Dasch and Bill Ready stood out in the Salem backfield department but the Viking line was sluggish.

Spurred by their first victory of the season last night, the Pelicans will be loaded for bear when they meet Coach John Roberts' Ashland Grizzlies next Friday night at Modoc field.

## Hogan Holds 4-Shot Margin At Portland

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 29 (AP)—Beltn Ben Hogan of Hershey, Pa., clung to a four-stroke lead today as the field teed off in the third lap of the 72-hole Portland Open golf tournament.

With that advantage and shooting sub-par golf, the little fellow who is making a links comeback after nearly three years in the service as an army lieutenant appeared practically a shoo-in to take the major prize of the \$14,333 war bonds event.

Fires 89

Hogan led the first round with a seven-under-par 65 for the Portland Country Club course. He talled off slightly in yesterday's second eighteen but his 69 was good enough to

stave off any and all challenges. The big rivals couldn't gain an inch. He opened today with 134 strokes behind him.

Harold "Jug" McSpaden of Sanford, Maine, one of the older troupers, kept up the same speed—but four strokes behind. McSpaden shot a second-round 69. He had the same the day before for a two-day total of 138.

Harry Bassler, Los Angeles, with a two-round 140, rested comfortably in third position while Jimmy Hines, Chicago, started firing today from the 141 bracket.

Snead, Nelson Tied

Two of the prime favorites, leading money winner, Byron Nelson of Toledo, O., and present national PGA champion, took off for his third round with 142 shots already posted on the score board. In the same class was Sam Snead of Hot Springs, Va., winner of last year's Portland Open shortly after he had doffed a sailor's uniform and 26 months in the navy.

Detroit's Tigers and the Chicago Cubs, already assured of no worse than a tie for the pennants, can clinch the championships today with a victory apiece.

Same Lead

The National league-leading Bruins, who are enjoying a three-game bulge on the runner-up St. Louis Cardinals, with only three games remaining on each team's schedule, grapple with the Pirates in a doubleheader in Pittsburgh. One win for the Cubs or a defeat by the Cards and it's all over.

The Tigers, leading Washington by one game, with two to go, can write finis to the Senators' faint hopes by taking the Browns, whom they meet in a single engagement in St. Louis. Meanwhile, the Nats, all through with their schedule, can only wait in agonizing idleness.

Confident Cubs

The confident Cubs have the right arms of ace Hank Borowy and Claude Passeau all geared and oiled by the Bucs, with 22-game winner Hank Wray and Southpaw Ray Prim standing by if needed.

The Cards, who tangle twice with the Reds, will keep one eye peeled on the Crosley field scoreboard. Manager Billy Southworth still has hopes of a mathematical tie and will bank on his ace, Red Barrett (23-12) and Ken Burkhardt (17-9).

The Tigers' outlook is not as rosy. Bengal Boss Steve O'Neill not being blessed with such a depth of pitching as possessed by the Cubs, indicating how thin the mound strength is spread, O'Neill said he probably would start Virgil (Fire) Trucks, his speed-baller who has just been released by the navy. Dizzy Trout will go to the hill Sunday.
