

TEACHERS HEAR W. A. SUTTON AT INSTITUTE

Klamath county teachers went to school Friday when institute was held at Klamath Union high school and Dr. Willis A. Sutton, former president of the National Educational association and superintendent emeritus of the Atlanta, Ga., public schools, spoke before the group.

"The great contribution that education has to offer young people must be fully recognized by society," said Dr. Sutton. "Society must spend more for education if we are to give adequate training to our young people. If education is to be improved, salaries must be higher to attract the better students into this field."

Improvements Needed

The well-known educator observed that family life in America must be improved if the nation is to continue to progress in a better way of living.

"Education has the responsibility of emphasizing to young and old the importance of a sound home life," he stressed. "Society must wake up to the great importance of the teacher in the training of young people for wholesome living, if we are to continue to make progress."

Morning Program

Fred Peterson, superintendent of Klamath county schools, presided at the morning session which opened with a piano solo by Mrs. Patricia Hunt and group singing led by Oland Warcup. Speakers in the morning included Dr. Frank Parr, executive secretary of OSTA, his subject being "OSTA Program for the Year 1945-46," and Supt. Rex Putnam, state head of public instruction, who brought greetings from the state office.

Luncheon was served at noon in the cafeteria under the direction of Mrs. F. O. Landry, and at the afternoon session, music included the girls' trio, Erlene Wheeler, Marie Wright and Dorothy Collier, accompanied by Mrs. Eloise McIntyre, and group singing led by Mrs. C. A. Henderson, accompanied by Mrs. Violette Moore.

Afternoon Session

Lillie Darby, president of OSTA, conducted the afternoon business session with minutes read by Eva Burkhalter, secretary. Joanna Givan presented a report for the legislative committee; Eva Burkhalter, constitution; Wilbur Robinette, membership. It was announced that membership was more than 99 per cent of the teaching profession.

Dr. Parr led the discussion on the retirement law, and Mrs. Gertrude Blum, state chairman, spoke on "Schools for War Program." It was announced that state schools raised nine and one-half million dollars last year in stamps and bonds.

Teachers of Lake county attended the institute and some 300 teachers and principals registered. Guests from out-of-town included Mrs. Ann Sprague, Lake county superintendent, Mr. and Mrs. C. R. Bowman and Mrs. Rex Putnam. Bowman is Jackson county superintendent.

'Red Devils' Opened Way Into Metz

Planting one terrific punch after another, the Fifth Infantry "Red Diamond" Division lunged 700 miles across France to spearhead capture of the fortress city of Metz, then helped General Patton write off the Battle of the Bulge.

In its whirlwind drive across France, the "Red Devils," as the Germans called the Fifth doughboys, traveled so fast they had to halt five days for supplies to catch up.

When it reached the Moselle, the Fifth was given the mission of establishing a bridgehead on the east bank in preparation for the Third Army's attack on Metz, which never had been captured by a frontal assault, although various armies had been trying for a couple of thousand years. The Fifth established the bridgehead after some of the most furious fighting of the war. Later, working with the 95th and 80th Divisions, it took the city after 10 days of furious battle. During the final operations of this assault, the Fifth took 4133 prisoners, killed an estimated 1048 and wounded 4000 more of the enemy.

In December, when the Germans under Von Rundstedt broke through in the desperate Ardennes offensive, the Fifth was one of the units used by General Patton to attack the flank of the Bulge. A month later the Red Devils were fighting around Prieux, France, and then swung into Luxembourg. War's end found the Fifth in Czechoslovakia.

PRESIDENT ATTENDS COURT CEREMONY

WASHINGTON, Oct. 1 (P)—President Truman made an unprecedented visit to the supreme court today to see his first appointee, Harold H. Burton of Ohio, sworn in as an associate justice.

Veteran court officials said that in the court's 155-year history no president had appeared in the court room while serving as chief executive.

Mr. Truman stepped into the yellow marble courtroom from a side entrance eight minutes before the black-robed justices marched to their bench at noon.

Court attaches escorted Mr. Truman to a mahogany counsel table directly beneath the bar and a few feet from Chief Justice Stone. From this point in front of the jammed courtroom he had an unobstructed view of the brief ceremony by which Burton, Ohio republican with whom the president served in the senate, became a member of the high tribunal.
