

ONE DAY'S PAY

The annual Klamath Community Fund drive opens Wednesday with a goal of \$75,280. This includes local Boy Scout, Girl Scout, Campfire Girl and Salvation Army activities; state charities and National War Fund. The Fund needs "One Day's Pay" from every worker. Most communities set their goal at TWO days' pay. The local committee decided to ask for only ONE day's pay, making a complete canvass to reach everyone in the county. By getting the support of everyone, the load on each is lightened. To make it still fairer, business firms have been asked to donate from \$100 to \$1000 in proportion to their earnings. These larger gifts will make up about half the quota. Now we need "ONE DAY'S PAY" from the wage and salary earners to make up the other half.

WHY A COMBINED DRIVE?

Prior to last year there were appeals by worthy organizations on an average of once every three weeks. This resulted in inconvenience to persons solicited, loss of time by persons asked to work on several different drives each year, and wasteful duplication in campaign expenses. In 1944 a combined drive was successfully held, including 34 agencies. One donation covered them all. This year the local fund includes 33 agencies, most of whom would hold individual drives if they were not included in a combined campaign. For your own convenience, give "One Day's Pay." National agencies such as USO, United Seamen's Service, United China Relief and similar agencies have raised their funds since 1942 in a combined drive known as the National War Fund. There is still a great need for USO Camp Shows for the boys waiting for return from overseas stations. Similar service is rendered to men at various military installations in this country.
