

COURT RULES RETURN OF \$10,000 GIFT

SALEM, Oct. 2 (AP)—Tom Ray, secretary and business agent for local 72, International Brotherhood of Boiler Makers, Iron Ship Builders and Helpers of America, Portland, must return the \$10,000 which the local voted him as a gift, the state supreme court held unanimously today.

The decision, by Justice J. O. Bailey, upheld Judge E. M. Page, Salem, who heard the case in Multnomah county.

A. E. Jordan and Jerry Martindale, president and secretary, respectively, of the local, brought the suit to recover the money. The union got the new officers after it was placed in receivership. The receivership contest involved a long court battle, in which the international organization of the union took over the local.

The supreme court's decision said:

"The members of the governing board had no authority whatsoever to pay or authorize the payment to Ray of the \$10,000, or any part thereof, here involved. It was not paid to him for services rendered or to be rendered in the future. It was a pure gratuity and unauthorized."

EXTORTION NOTE AUTHOR DISCOVERED

SPOKANE, Oct. 2 (AP)—L. V. Boardman, special FBI agent, said today that Frederick John Komar, 34, owner of a radiator shop here, had confessed sending a \$10,000 extortion note to Louis and Lorenz Costello, owners of a tavern.

Boardman said Komar was taken into custody when he appeared at a designated spot in the suburbs where a bundle of bills was to have been left by the Costellos as directed in an extortion note they received.

The note, Boardman said, threatened death unless the money was delivered.

Komar, held without charge, will be arraigned today, Boardman said.

3003 Students Registered At OSC

CORVALLIS, Oct. 2 (AP)—Registration for the fall term at Oregon State college reached 3003 today, an increase of more than 1000 students and 53 per cent over a year ago. The freshman class numbers 1550 and total new students 1656, both up 78 per cent.

Enrollment of men is now 1180, an increase of 168 per cent, while the women's total is at an alltime record high of 1823, up 20 per cent from a year ago.

Sight-Seers of 6th Toured Pacific

In World War 1 the Sixth Infantry Division was in so many engagements and made so many long marches about France that it was given the nickname "The Sixth." The sight-seers of the Sixth.



The Sixth in this war upheld that reputation. Its six-pointed star shoulder patch was seen throughout the Pacific, from Hawaii to the far reaches of New Guinea.

The sight-seers had one of the toughest assignments in the capture of Luzon. They landed at Lingayen Gulf January 9, 1945, and went straight to the hills in pursuit of the Japs.

While most of the other invading divisions were working on fairly flat terrain, the Sixth was in the mountains attacking formidable Nip positions. In the first month of the campaign, the Sixth killed 5000 Japs, and during the fierce battle around Munoz knocked out 57 Jap medium and light tanks and destroyed a great number of artillery pieces.

The Sixth's first job was the defense of Oahu. In 1944 it set sail for Milne Bay, New Guinea and later moved to the Toem-Wadke area. In July the Sight-Seers went into action west of Toem and met and defeated the Japs in the bloody battle of Lone Tree Hill. With little rest, the Sixth moved again. This time the men landed at Sansapor on the Vogelkop Peninsula in the Netherlands East Indies. Striking swiftly, they rapidly secured the Sansapor coast and garrisoned that area until it joined the armada that sailed against Luzon.
