

OCTOBER 15 IS DEADLINE FOR OVERSEAS MAIL

There are only 10 more mailing days until the October 15 deadline for sending Christmas packages to overseas servicemen. The home extension service of Oregon State college has been granted the privilege of inspecting and labeling cans of food to be mailed. Both cans and labels may be obtained in the Klamath office of the service, 208 federal building, at cost.

Food will be inspected, cans packed and sealed in the office, and may be mailed from the post office on the floor below.

Mrs. Winnifred K. Gillen, home demonstration agent, will gladly suggest types of food which have been found especially popular with service personnel away from home, and furnish recipes for making these items.

No foods that cannot be inspected in the office may be sent. Mrs. Gillen reminds housewives. Banned foods include: home canned meat, poultry, fruit, vegetables, jellies, jams and pickles. Commercially packed glass jars of these foods may be sent, however, and may be packed successfully in cans for mailing.

NAVY ACCEPTS MEN FOR RE-ENLISTMENT

The navy is now accepting men between 17 and 30 years of age for re-enlistment in the regular navy.

Men discharged from the navy, naval reserve, coast guard, army or marines, with or without dependents who pass the physical examination are eligible now.

Those who have been discharged from navy or naval reserve will be enlisted with continuous service if enlisted within 90 days after discharge. Men who enlist within 30 days of discharge will receive 30 days leave before they are called to active duty. Ex-navy men will also be re-enlisted with the same rating held when discharged.

Men interested in serving in the navy may contact Al C. Friesen Ch. Sp. (R) in the navy recruiting sub-station, Klamath office, post office building.

Married Vets To Use Housing Unit

PORTLAND, Oct. 3 (P)—Married veterans at Eastern Oregon College of Education will have 24 houses at La Grande.

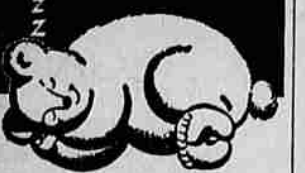
The national housing agency approved completion of 24 of the 40 housing units whose construction was halted at the war's end. The homes were originally intended for La Grande war workers.

Dairy Cows Steal Sales Limelight

PORTLAND, Oct. 3 (P)—Dairy cows—selling like hotcakes—have taken the spotlight from refrigerators and washing machines at Willamette valley farm sales, the Oregon Journal said yesterday.

Many culls are bringing \$35 to \$80 as family cows, the newspaper reported. Valley dealers pay \$140 to \$180 for large heifers for shipment to California, where dairies depend largely upon imported heifers.

Other reports from farm auction observers: saddle horses sell better through classified ads than at sales; 30-40 pound weaner pigs that formerly sold for \$18 now go for \$8.

PURPLE HEART FOR SPANISH WAR VET

ALTURAS—Forty-six years after being wounded in action during the Spanish-American war, Thom H. Ballard received the Purple Heart.

Ballard was wounded on the Zapota river, Luzon island, Philippines, while a private in company I, 14th infantry. The citation reads in part: "The commanding general ARS directs that an appropriately engraved Purple Heart be issued to Thom H. Ballard of Alturas, Calif., on account of wounds received in action, June 13, 1899." Signed, A. B. Watson, Adj. Gen.

Ballard, who has served as recorder and auditor of Modoc county for 40 years, still carries one of the bullets in his body.

ANGRY POLES TRY TO LYNCH GERMAN

LUENEBURG, Germany, Oct. 3—(P)—An angry throng of displaced Poles, watching the reburial of 243 murdered victims of the nazis in a pine forest at the outskirts of Luenenburg, tried vainly today to lynch one of the Germans being forced to do the job.

While 24 of Luenenburg's leading nazis were completing the reburial, one was identified by a Pole as Kurt Kautsch, formerly deputy commandant of the Lodz concentration camp in Poland.

"This is the murderer Kautsch," the Pole screamed. "This is the man who beat my brother."

The crowd picked up clubs and started closing in. Belgian military police unslinging their guns and fired over the heads of the Poles. The crowd fell back, but the angry Poles continued shouting and spitting at him and brandishing clubs.

Kautsch was arrested and placed in the Luenenburg jail.
