

MILLS FUNERAL TO TAKE PLACE ON THURSDAY

Final rites for Mrs. Lyle O. Mills, who died at Klamath Valley hospital Tuesday morning, will be held from the Earl Whitlock chapel at 2:30 p. m. Thursday with the Rev. F. C. Wisselbach officiating. Burial will take place in the family plot, Linkville cemetery.

Mrs. Mills was one of the county's most beloved matrons and her passing is keenly felt by scores of friends. She was born Jessie Gwendolen McCormick, daughter of Thomas and Georgianna Andrews McCormick, on March 13, 1877 in Hayes, Lincoln county, Kansas.

Left Kansas
With her parents and three older brothers and sisters, she left Kansas in 1882, coming west by train and wagon train, through North Platte, Cheyenne, Boise and Baker City. The family settled in La Grande in 1885 and in July, 1887, came to Klamath county.

Mr. McCormick moved his family to Keno where he built the first small sawmill and later built and operated a small stern-wheel steamer, "The Canby," which ran between Klamath Falls and Keno.

Lived in Keno
In 1900, Jessie McCormick and Lyle O. Mills were married and made their home in Keno. Mills had moved here from his native state of Michigan in 1908. Mr. and Mrs. Mills built a home at the corner of Alameda and Esplanade in this city and resided there with their son, DeLos, until 10 years ago, when they moved to their present home in the Pine Grove area.

Mrs. Mills was a member of St. Paul's Episcopal church, Aloha chapter, Order of the Eastern Star and the Art Needlework club.

Honorary pallbearers will be old family friends, Horace E. Getz, Dr. H. M. Brown, A. B. Epperson and Orb Campbell, and active pallbearers will be E. B. Goeckner, Jack Murphy, Paul O. Landry, Lawrence Bertam, Lloyd Prock and D. D. Reeder.

Orem, fireman, first class, USNR, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ira Orem, Route 2, have been serving on this escort aircraft carrier.

Robert C. Barr, 25, seaman, second class, USNR, Whitehorse, Calif., served on this battleship, which reached the West Coast on September 13 to become the first vessel of her kind to return to the States since the close of the war.

James K. Short, 19, seaman, first class, Route 2, Klamath Falls, is serving on this attack transport, which climaxed her career of landing assault troops on Tarawa, Roi-Namur, Saipan, Guam, Leyte, Lingayen and Okinawa by landing occupation forces in Japan.

The Sheridan, commissioned in July, 1943, carried more than 30,000 troops and their equipment to Pacific battle fronts with only one casualty—the soldier who got into his assault boat and sat on his bayonet.

William R. Colwin, 27, radioman, second class, USNR, whose wife Pauline Colwin and two children live in Lakeview, Ore., has been serving on this escort aircraft carrier.

Military Spirit Still Prevails In Jap Schools

NIKKO, Japan, Oct. 3 (AP)—Japan's surrender and stated willingness to weed militarism out of education outwardly haven't affected the nation's No. 1 school for boys.

The School for Peers, where Japan trains princes and future leaders, still stresses bushido in spirit if not in military subjects.

Military Air
To an American observer the school has a distinct military air from the instruction to the way the boys march, bow and salute, especially good student "Masahito is in the fourth grade."

Crown Prince Akihito, 11, and Prince Masahito, 9, are students at the Nikko school, which is controlled not by the education ministry but by the ministry of the imperial household. Akihito is in the sixth grade and is described by instructors as "an especially good student."

Day-long Classes
A saber-carrying officer looks out for the princes while they attend the day-long classes in the hotel. They are returned to the nearby summer palace in a Packard limousine. The other boys, numbering 143, occupy the Kanaya quarters. There are 450 in the upper classes.

I saw the boys gather in the hotel courtyard today for a fencing lesson. They were wearing mustard-colored uniforms and were carrying bamboo swords.

One boy stepped forward. "Klotsuke," he commanded shrilly.

The boys came to attention. "Keirei," he said.

They bowed to the instructor, then marched off in a column of fours with the swords on their shoulders like rifles.

Families Represented
The students, representing Japan's wealth as well as royal blood, include the son of the late Admiral Yamamoto, the son of one of the bankers yasuda—there are half a dozen in the Jap-

anese Who's Who—two boys related to the imperial family, and the son of Professor Ishikawa of the Tokyo Imperial university.

The other day an American officer spoke to one of the classes in Japanese. His subject was holidays in America. When he finished, the boys overwhelmed him with questions far removed from Christmas or the Fourth of July.

"What does the B-29 look like inside?"

10,228 New Claims Made By Jobless

SALEM, Oct. 3 (AP)—The state employment compensation commission said today it has received 10,228 new claims for jobless benefits in the six weeks since the war ended, but that benefits have been paid to only 3509 of the applicants.

The commission paid \$160,043 in benefits last month. It paid \$435,446 in benefits during the first nine months of the year.

ARTIST COMPLETES INDIAN SKETCHES

W. Langdon Kihn has now completed sketches on the Klamath Indian reservation and is returning to his studio in Hadlyme, Conn., where he will paint in the details this winter.

Kihn, international illustrator and magazine writer, is on a 10-year assignment with National Geographic magazine to paint canvases of Indian tribes throughout the continent of North America. He is trying to capture in his pictures the Indian ways of life of 50 years ago, before they are entirely lost to history.

The painter has completed canvases of the plains Indians and the Alaska Indians and they have already been published in National Geographic.

Mrs. Kihn, also a recognized writer and illustrator, accompanies her husband and assists in his work. They will return to the northwest next year to make sketches of the country

near Salem and in Washington, and will go from there to Canada.

Manslaughter Charge Filed Against Boxer

SCRANTON, Pa., Oct. 3 (AP)—Involuntary manslaughter charges have been filed against Andy Hellin, 18-year-old Taylor (Pa.) middleweight boxer, following the death of his Monday night opponent, Johnny Dezin-ski, 32, of Plains, Pa.

Dr. Paul Kubasko, Lackawanna county coroner, said Dezin-ski's head struck the ring floor after he was dropped by a punch less than a minute before the end of a four-round bout. He was taken to a hospital where he died several hours after the fight.
