Newhouser Has Alibi For Licking

DETROIT, Oct. 4 (AP)—The Detroit Tigers' pitching star of the last two American league campaigns, Hal Newhouser, has learned the woes of frustration. Winner of 25 games in the hectic 1945 flag race but loser 9 to 0 to the Chicago Cubs in the world series opener, the lean left-hander had no trouble coming up with the answer:

"I simply didn't know how to pitch to them; they're all new to me."

Newhouser, batted out of the box only seven times in his 36 starts against American league hitting, served up base hits to exactly half the 10 Cub batters who faced him in the 2-2-3 innings he lasted in his first world series appearance.

Zamperini In Hospital For Checkup

HAMILTON FIELD, Calif., (P)—Capt. Lou Zamperini, former national mile champion, is undergoing a physical checkup at Letterman hospital today following his arrival here from the Pacific yesterday aboard an army transport command plane.

Zamperini was held in Japanese prison camps for more than two years after he had drifted 1000 miles on a life raft in 47 days following the crash of the Palmyra in June, 1943, of the plane on which he was bombardier. He was picked up by Japanese navy fishermen near the Marshall Islands.

As a result of torture and starvation he suffered while in prison Zamperini will never enter competitive races again. He hopes to find a coaching job or go into aviation.

FIRCREST GOLF CLUB, Tacoma, Wash., Oct. 4 (P)—Clouds hung low and dripping over Fircrest last night and the golfing faithful who recalled what happened two weeks ago in a downpour at Spokane were ready to give Tacoma's \$10,500 Open tournament a new title: "The Rain and Mr. Nelson."

No cards were kept, but all said Givan was low for the four-some with 69.

A lot more serious about the last workout for the 72-hole event were others of the touring professionals, who also remembered that Nelson splattered through the Spokane rain in 266, or 22 strokes under par.

Lorenz was recently honorably discharged from the army air corps and hails from Billings, Mont. Reiman, a Corvallis boy, has just been honorably discharged by the navy.

This Saturday's game will be the 33rd meeting of Oregon State and Washington State. The Beavers have won 16, the Cougars 15 and one contest ended in a 3-3 tie. Washington State scored a 26 to 13 victory over the Orange in the last game played between the two state schools in 1942.

The Oregon prep spotlight will be bent on Eugene tomorrow (Friday), where a determined band of Axemen will make a desperate stab at stopping the victory path of Medford's Black Tornado.

Eugene, unbeaten in last year's No-Name play and with two 1945 victories under its belt, is Medford's toughest opponent so far this season. The defending state champion, most of its regulars back, has blanked both opponents so far and piled up a two-game score of 108 points.

Pelicans Favored
Ashland, another unscathed upon Southern Oregon team, opens the Southern Oregon conference tomorrow with a trek to Klamath Falls. Despite Ashland's impressive two-game aggregate of 87, oddsmakers lean slightly toward the Pelicans. Ashland's first opponents, they claim, were push-overs.

Also earmarked as fair-haired squads in Southern Oregon tilts tomorrow are Grants Pass over Marshfield; Cottage Grove, tri-county defending titlist, over Junction City in their initial league game; and Roseburg over University High in a second tri-county fracas.

Salem, its wingmen battered by Klamath Falls in last week's slaughter, will entertain Albany in both squads' first No-Name tilt. Springfield, one up and one down in No-Name play, will host a strong Corvallis squad.

Traditional Game
A quarter-century tradition will take The Dalles—unbeaten in Oregon but downed by a tough Camas squad—to twice-beaten Bend. The only Blue mountain contest pits second-place Baker against cellar-sitter Mac Hi.

P. S.—The Cubs won the National league pennant with Borowy; the Yanks finished in fourth place in the American league without him.

Connie Mack, 82-year-old boss of the Philadelphia Athletics, also asserted that Borowy did not pitch a good game. "Borowy was in trouble in the first six innings and only superlative work by Andy Pafko and Phil Savaretta saved him," declared the dignified old maestro of the A's. "I still have faith in the Tigers."

Bookmakers now favor the Cubs 5 to 8.

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Glue-Footed Tigers Meet Cubs In 2nd Series Game

DETROIT, Oct. 4 (P)—If the Detroit Tigers show up today, the Chicago Cubs take them on again in the second game of the 1945 world series, but it will be a long piece before the folks forget the "ice water" Handy Andy Pafko must use for blood and the watermelon-sized heart Hank Borowy has ticking for him.

Out of the shambles left of the American league series hopes after the clouting Cubs practically beat the Bengals' brains out for that 9-0 decision in yesterday's opener, these two factors stand out—these and the Mau O' War speed of the Cubs afield, compared to the general glue-footedness of the old men of Detroit.

Tigers Glue-Footed
Incidentally, this glue-footedness of the Detroiters in general and Outfielders Roy Cullenbine and Hank Greenberg and Infielders Skeeter Webb and Eddie Mayo in particular had the "ex-

ports," who didn't watch the American league much this year, wondering today just how come the Tigers managed to win the junior circuit championship. Some of the more exuberant National leaguers, in fact, were even talking of a four-straight series, because the Chicago champs went over the "big hump" by knocking off the Tigers' head man, 25-game winner Hal Newhouser, in the opener.

Chicago Favored
As a result, the hotel lobby bookmakers, who can add one and one and get to two quicker than most folks, switched their "line" all the way from 10 to 13 with Detroit favored, to 5 to 8 with the Cubs the choice to take their first world championship in 37 years.

However, they tabbed the Tigers at 5 to 6 to win today's tussle behind Virgil Trucks, who's nicknamed "Fire" because he can rear back and come in with that high hard one so hot you can just about light a cigar from it. If you like the Cubs and Hank Wyse, the 22-game right-hander, it's even money for the second scuffle, which figures to draw another crowd to Mr. Briggs' baseball pasture as big or bigger than yesterday's 54,637, especially since the weather man promises the boys won't have to play in an icebox, like yesterday's refrigerated fuss.
