

FIVE COUNTIES TO GET STATE FIRE CUSTODY

SALEM, Oct. 5 (AP)—Protection of the 250,000-acre Tillamook burn area, three times ravaged by fire since 1933, became a state responsibility today after the Northwest Fire Protective association said its resources were exhausted by spending \$300,000 fighting the blaze last summer.

The state forestry board, at the request of the association, voted to take over protection in Clatsop, Columbia, Tillamook, Washington and Yamhill counties, the area formerly protected by the association. The association will continue to function, but only to collect fees from its members. These fees will be paid to the state.

The five counties will become a state fire protection district, similar to those now being operated by the state forestry board in Josephine, Jackson and several eastern Oregon counties.
