The pastor of Immanuel Baptist, the Rev. Charles J. Sundstrom, announces an appropriate program for the occasion, with special music by the choir, and offers a warm welcome to all strangers in town to attend. Mrs. Stanley Gordh of Portland will be soloist.

The subject of the morning sermon is "An Old World Becomes New." A lot of good music will be heard at evening worship services, with the pastor's family participating with vocal and instrumental selections. A "singspiration" will follow, after which refreshments will be served.

DROP IN POSTAL RECEIPTS REPORTED

First decrease in postal receipts since 1935, for the Klamath Falls post office was reported today by Postmaster Burt E. Hawkins.

Receipts for September, 1945, amounted to \$16,179.36, showing a decrease of 14.223 per cent as compared to September, 1944.

A quarterly decrease was also shown for the September, 1945 quarter, of 3.434 per cent lower than the same quarter in 1944. Quarterly receipts for September this year totaled \$52,701.43.

This decrease, the postmaster believes, is due to a combination of circumstances, namely the

exodus from the naval air station, return of thousands of men from overseas, and to the lumber strike.

SALEM, Oct. 5 (P)—Governor Earl Snell, asking that the week October 7-13 be observed as Fire Prevention Week, said that Oregon fire losses in 1944 totaled \$9,500,000, or nearly three times the average for the preceding 10 years.
