

K-MEN BATTLE ASHLAND TONIGHT

Pelicans Given Slight Edge Over Rival Eleven

Both Teams Exactly Equal In Weight; Klamath May Be Troubled By Injuries

The Klamath Pelicans will play their first Southern Oregon conference game of the season tonight at 8 o'clock on Modoc field when they tangle with Coach John Roberts' Ashland Grizzlies.

The two elevens are exactly equal in weight with both starting lineups averaging 161 pounds and both boast plenty of speed.

The Grizzlies launch their offensive from a double wing while the K-men will stick to the T formation.

At the same time the Pelicans take the field against Ashland, Medford will tangle with Eugene and Grants Pass takes on Coos Bay.

Coach Paul Angstead said Thursday that his charges were not in the best of physical trim for the ensuing battle with a good many of the boys favoring a twisted ankle or a bad knee.

Bill Sari, Klamath right tackle, is scheduled to start the ball game but Angstead will not be positive of his starting lineup until kickoff time.

Jim Pope is slated to replace Dee Nelson at left end as Pope has shown up well in practice sessions lately. He has proved to be a dependable pass receiver and snagged an aerial against Salem last week that was good for a touchdown.

The remainder of the Klamath lineup will be the same with Tommy Edwards, Bob Redkey, Herbert Barker and Leroy Coleman in the backfield and Pope, Richard Foust, Harold Wirth, Roger Vanderhoff, Bob Eastman, Sari, and Chuck Thurman composing the forward wall.

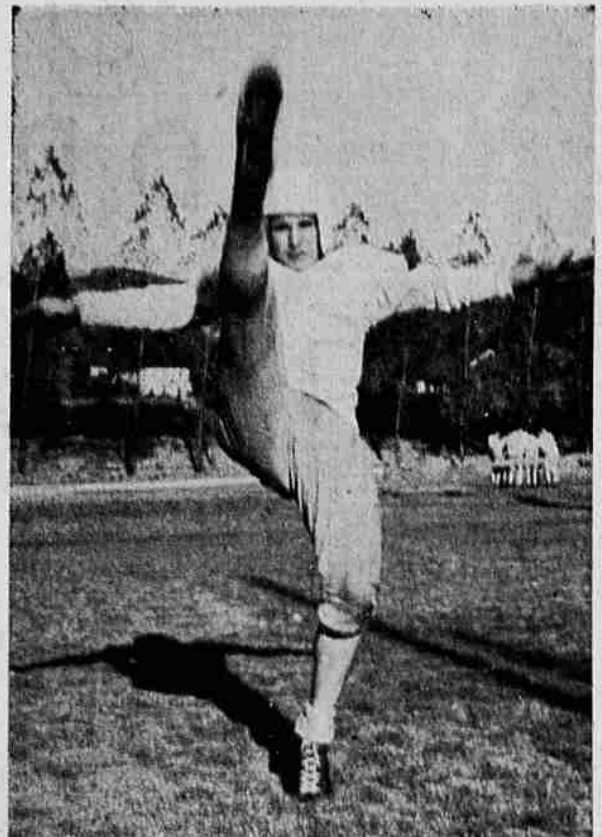
