## KLAMATH SOLDIER STRANDED ON LEDGE

T/Sgt. John Carrier of Klamath Falls was one of two Peterson Field, Colo., men recently stranded overnight on a ledge in Royal Gorge of the Colorado.

Carrier was a member of a GI sight-seeing party which had taken a tour to the gorge, located in the Rocky mountains. He and PFC Francis Lovett of New Orleans started down the side of the gorge in an attempt to find a good spot from which to take pictures. After descending about 800 feet down the canyon wall they discovered that they could neither retrace their steps or go on.

Lovett tried the descent but fell 150 feet down the cliff to another ledge. He was rescued by a human chain and taken to a Canyon City hospital.

Carrier spent the rest of the night on the ledge and was lowered to the floor of the canyon the next morning by ropes.
