

# Local DAR Chapter Greets State Head

Members of Eulalona chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution, were hostesses to their visiting state regent, Mrs. Burton B. Lowry of Medford, Monday evening, October 1, at the home of Mrs. Alfred Collier. Accompanying Mrs. Lowry on her official visit was Mrs. Frances Cochran.

Hostess chairman, Mrs. Collier, seated the group at tables throughout the rooms of her home at what was designated as a potluck luncheon but which turned out to be a sumptuous banquet.
