## 45 Hurt, Seven Strikers Jailed After Wild Fight At Warner Brothers Studio

HOLLYWOOD, Oct. 8 (AP)—Two policemen and 43 strikers were injured today and seven others arrested after a wild fight at the entrance of Warner Brothers studio. The fight ensued as officers charged a mass group of 200 pickets and cleared a passageway for studio workers.

### Lakeview Sailor In Okinawa Thrust

LAKEVIEW, (Special)—RM 2/c William R. Colvin, 27, who survived one sinking in the Atlantic ocean, wound up his battle record in the Okinawa campaign and the invasion of Borneo, according to word received here, Colvin, whose wife and two children live in Lakeview, served on the first Block Island, escort aircraft carrier that was sunk by a German submarine off Africa in May, 1944.

Accompanying destroyer escorts picked up every man of the crew and then finished off the U-boat. The crew, almost intact, was assigned to a new escort carrier, re-named the Block Island. She reached the Pacific in time to take part in the Okinawa campaign and the invasion of Borneo. Colvin enlisted in the naval reserve July 28, 1942.

which the workers passed into the studio. Witnesses said some of the pickets used canes and clubs in the battle.

Two ambulances took the injured pickets to hospitals. The entrance gates to the studio were the same place where fighting broke out last Friday and some 25 or more men and women were injured.

Court injunctions were issued Saturday ordering the studio and workers, to restrain from violence.

Following the affray this morning approximately 350 studio workers passed into the film plant through the passageway formed by police. Pickets fell back into groups and picketing was discontinued. Then a battle of loudspeakers began, with one inside the studio exhorting workers to report to their jobs and another speaker outside, operated by the AFL conference of studio unions, urging them to stay outside.

Herbert K. Sorrell, strike leader and head of CSU, was hit in the eye during the affray.

## Eight Men Killed In Bomber Crash

KODIAK, Alaska, Oct. 8 (AP)—A navy PBV bomber, returning from the western Aleutians, crashed when the pilot attempted a landing at the naval air station in bad weather last Wednesday, killing eight of the 15 navy men aboard, the 17th naval district headquarters announced. Six were killed instantly, two died in the hospital later. The pilot was one of the victims.

## MEXICAN INJURED IN JAIL BRAWL

TULELAKE — Jose Solorio, about 50, Mexican, was in Klamath Valley hospital, Klamath Falls, suffering from severe bruises and rib injuries as the result of a fracas which officers said took place in the city jail late Saturday night.

Solorio was arrested on a charge of drunkenness and was placed with 12 others in the jail, officers said. In the meantime a quarrel over the use of bunks and blankets ensued and when Chief of Police Frank G. Rhodes was in the act of placing another drunk in jail, he noticed Solorio on the floor, groaning. Rhodes was accompanied by State Highway Patrolman Gerald Wilson and City Police Officer Tex Harris.

Officers said it was necessary to pull their guns to quiet the men and force them to return to their bunks.

Police held four men through-out Sunday on an open charge and Monday released three of the quartet after, they said, a signed confession was obtained from Samuel Johnson, 25, who admitted beating the Mexican.

No charge was placed against Johnson pending the outcome of Solorio's condition which hospital authorities said late Monday was good. Solorio is not an itinerant worker but has been around Tulelake and Klamath Falls for several years.

## COURT CASES FOR OCTOBER CHANGED

Some changes were made in the October docket for circuit court here this morning by Judge David R. Vandenberg of the 13th judicial district who has been assigned to hear cases in the 4th judicial district from and after October 8, 1945, and continuing for two weeks.

The 4th judicial district covers Multnomah county. The case of the state vs. James Phillips, charged with grand larceny, was set for trial November 1 instead of October 18.

Trial dates for four other criminal cases were not changed. They were state vs. M. J. Young, negligent homicide, October 22; state vs. Joseph T. McInturf, drunken driving, October 25; state vs. Dennis Gathwright, possession of stolen property, October 29; and state vs. A. L. Travis, obtaining money and property by false pretenses, October 31.
