

Indian Expression On SB 1313 To Be Urged Further

Wade and Ida Crawford, sponsors of SB 1313 to give full citizenship to Klamath Indians, said today they will continue to press for consideration of this measure by the Indians when instructions are prepared for the Klamath Indian delegates to Washington.

Three resolutions introduced by the Crawfords at a general council last week, sought to have SB 1313 and other important proposals of theirs placed before the Indians by secret ballot as a referendum at the tribal election October 18. The Crawfords failed at the council meeting to have this done, but said today that press reports of the meeting may have misled the public into believing the measures themselves were voted on.

They stated today that after the election of the business committee October 18, instructions will be prepared for the Indian delegates to Washington. They will then seek consideration of their proposed measures by the business committee and tribe.

In addition to support of SB 1313, the resolutions favor abolishment of the tribal loan board and favor limiting the authority of the business committee of eight members.

The Crawfords said their effort of last week was to have tribal expressions on the mea-

FIRE PREVENTION WEEK PROCLAIMED

The week of October 7 to October 13 has been proclaimed "Fire Prevention Week" by Mayor Ed Ostendorf in keeping with a proclamation issued by President Truman.

The mayor's statement is as follows:

Fire loss in the United States each year not only destroys hundreds of millions of dollars worth of property but thousands of human lives as well.

The city of Klamath Falls suffers its proportionate share despite the fact that most fires can be easily avoided. Defective wiring, bad flues, rubbish and individual carelessness are the most frequent causes of fire.

In view of the increasing recognition that fires are largely a preventable evil, proper care with fire hazards would greatly reduce such a regrettable loss of life and property, and every effort should be made to relieve the people of this huge toll. The president of the United States, by a proclamation dated October 1, 1945, has designated the week beginning October 7, 1945, as "Fire Prevention Week."

Now, therefore, I, Ed Ostendorf, mayor of the city of Klamath Falls, Ore., in keeping with the proclamation heretofore issued by the president of the United States, do hereby designate and proclaim the period from October 7 to October 13, 1945, as

"Fire Prevention Week" and I most earnestly urge that all civic organizations, business associations, school authorities and all other bodies interested in public welfare to assist in furthering this important occasion. In witness whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the city of Klamath Falls, Oregon, to be affixed at Klamath Falls this 6th day of October, 1945.

asures done by secret ballot in "the American way." "The American way is the way for the American Indian," they commented.

They said there was no discussion of the merits of the measures, and no vote was taken on SB 1313 itself. Mrs. Crawford read the bill with two suggested amendments. They said the vote for secret ballot consideration was taken on a standing vote, with a federal officer counting the vote.

The Crawfords introduced to the council a 10-year spending program of the Indian bureau which they claimed absorbs the entire timber receipts for the next 10 years. Wade Crawford said he compiled the figures from official records, showing the intention of the bureau for timber cut and expenditures in the 10-year period. Here is the table as he presented it:

The Crawfords quoted a letter from Assistant Indian Commissioner William Zimmerman in which he said he did not believe SB 1313 would be approved by congress, but that congress might go part way and approve a larger per capita payment. The letter said Zimmerman did not personally favor a \$1000 per capita payment from the Yamsay judgment money.

The Crawfords said, however, that Superintendent Courtwright of the Klamath Agency assured the Indians that the \$1000 per capita payments would be made. The Crawfords asserted they are on record favoring this payment.

North Nominated For Mayor At Lakeview

LAKEVIEW, (Special)—Rod Waters declined re-nomination for mayor of Lakeview at the annual city nominating session last week. Lyle North was nominated for the post.

Charles Thomas also declined re-nomination for councilman, and the elevation of Lyle North from councilman to mayor, left another vacant spot. Nominated to fill these positions were Walter McCaw and Harry Anthony.

The general election will be held Tuesday, November 26, at which time voters will also vote on a tax levy for street paving.

At the town council meeting Tuesday, the following judges and clerks were named for the coming election, D. H. Bemis, W. Wyckman, judges, and Mrs. Walt Sandquist and Mrs. O. C. Gibbs, clerks.

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Marines Land On Shores Of Troubled North China

TIENTSIN, China, Oct. 8 (AP)—U. S. marines landed in force at three points on the shores of troubled north China yesterday to assist Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek regain control over the last major area still dominated by Japanese.

Move Inland
While a force of 200 U. S. 7th fleet transports and warships stood off the Taku river bar, veterans of the first marine division, accustomed to "pay as you go" jungle warfare from Guadalcanal to Okinawa, took possession of Taku and nearby Tangku port facilities and moved progressively inland toward the former treaty port and railroad hub of Tientsin.

At the same time, a smaller landing team from the 8th division swept ashore at Chinwangtao, an all weather port and outlet for the rich Kailan coal mines on the gulf of Chihli.

Third amphibious corps headquarters, commanded by Maj. Gen. Keller E. Rockey, Washington, D. C., made it plain that return of the marines to China was for the purpose of maintaining law and order and not to participate in internal disputes.

Tension Mounts
Tension has mounted in this area of North China, where the Japanese have more than 250,000 troops supported by puppet forces who have been under their domination since the Marco Polo bridge incident touched off the Sino-Japanese war eight years ago. Chinese communists eighth route army forces, while not in control of any major cities, have more than 35,000

troops camped in the country outside Peking and Tientsin. These elements have continued despite the cessation of hostilities elsewhere.

being struck.—Jackson, Miss., News.

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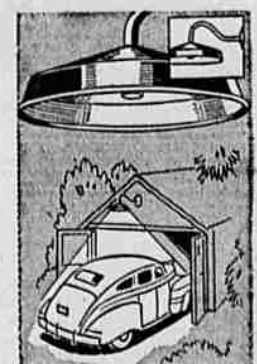
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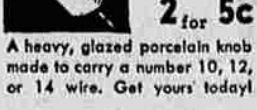
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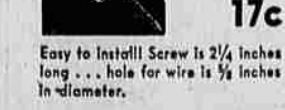
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
