The more you see of continental Europe (the Scandinavian countries excepted) the less you find it in your heart to blame these people for turning to communism.

We would be fools to turn to communism, for the BEST it has to offer isn't as good as our WORST. But in a lot of Europe communism DOES have something to offer, and you can't blame those people for turning toward it with perhaps something of hope in their eyes.

TRUCK SHOP TO BE INSTALLED AT LOMBARD'S

Lombard Motors, Dodge-Plymouth dealer here since 1941, is planning to add an exclusive truck shop, L. L. Lombard, partner in the dealership, told Dodge officials at the factory last week.

In a conference with Al Green, Dodge director of business management, Lombard revealed plans for a 100x106 addition to make his building 100x260 feet.

Heavy-Duty Service
"It will be equipped for all kinds of heavy-duty service, including diesel, and will have a lube pit for high pressure truck lubrication. It will also have full equipment for heavy-duty truck work, frame straightening

and all body bumping and reconditioning."

Lombard said he was preparing to handle a potential of 600 new cars and trucks a year. "I expect that one-third (200) of the units will be trucks ranging all the way from the half-ton pickups on through to the heavy-duty."

"I came into the factory with an order in my pocket for 50 trucks. "We're in a comparatively good truck area, where business is largely farming, but the farmers are big operators, all machinery minded. We're also in the heart of the lumber industry. That is why a truck shop in our country has to be equipped for service on heavy-duty equipment."
