

# Interest Shown By City Fathers Over Naval Air Station

City fathers continued their interest in the Klamath naval air station, which will go on caretaker basis November 1, and Mayor Ed Ostendorf advised the council Monday night that he would keep in touch with Lane W. Wilcox, Seattle, superintendent of airports, CAA, to protect the city's investment in that property.

**Letter Read**  
A letter from Wilcox, in reply to one written by the mayor, stated that he had contacted Naval Air Bases in Seattle and was advised that they were not in a position to definitely answer when the airport would be turned back to the city for operation.

The navy, Wilcox said, was now in the process of establishing a policy with regards to surplus navy fields.

"As long as the airport is on caretaker status and the navy lease has not been cancelled," Wilcox said in his letter, "the city of Klamath Falls will not be asked to participate in the maintenance of the field. When the lease is cancelled, it will be the responsibility of the city to operate and maintain the airport. However, the field can not be used by private aviation during the period of caretaker status."

The council discussed the possibility of obtaining some of the buildings now on the airport site, and City Attorney Henry Perkins deplored the fact that when the city had the right to buy such surplus as it would need, the time was so short in which to obtain the money that the city was at a disadvantage.

**"Not to be Asleep"**  
Councilman Rollin Cantrill observed that the city should "not be asleep" when it is time for action in regard to the station and Councilman Paul O. Landry suggested that the council go to the station as much as possible in order to keep in touch with such equipment the city will need and be able to handle.

At the suggestion of the city park board, the city will pay 50 per cent of a road repair bill of \$2073.15, incurred in Moore park. At the same time, the board protested that the city pay the entire bill because the park board originally paid for the paving in the same manner as an improvement district and with money derived from the state gas tax. It was suggested that such money should be spent on roads in the park in the same manner as on streets in the city.

**Offers Made**  
An offer of \$2000 cash for lots 2C, 2D, and 2E, block 5, E. Fair road addition, was made by Leo N. and Grace E. Huis. The matter was referred to the property committee to report back next week.

Offers of \$250 cash on lot 16, block 46, Hillside, by Charles G. Woodhouse, and \$425 for lot 4, block 36, Buena Vista addition, by K. N. and Lettie Boydstrup, were accepted.

The city will pay \$12,000 to Ginevra Finnell for property in the area designated for the Veterans' Memorial park. An ordinance was introduced and passed the first and second reading authorizing such action.

Columbus Day, October 12, will be observed by the city as a holiday and the city hall will be closed. The motion was made by Landry.

**Trees Offered**  
Surplus young trees in Moore park, principally elm and box elder, were offered to the city by the park board, the board not to be billed for moving the trees. The offer was accepted. A number of property owners have been advised to remove poplar trees due to sewer damage and when necessary, these trees will be replaced.

The city authorized the Klamath Falls Creamery to use lots on Esplanade to pile wood in view of the possible winter shortage. Keith Ambrose, city fire chief, said in his opinion any

wood yard left "a mess" although he agreed with Landry as to the integrity of the property owners.

**Permission Granted**  
The fire chief was granted permission to stage a small parade Tuesday at noon in recognition of National Fire Prevention Week.

The council suggested the standards at the entrance of Roseway drive be removed following a report from City Engineer E. A. Thomas. The group also authorized the installation of a light at the intersection of Pacific Terrace and Huron.

Thomas submitted a report as to the resurfacing and repairing of paved streets for the 1945 season. Resurfacing was done by Warren Northwest Inc. Thirty-seven streets had patching completed, and 18 streets were involved in resurfacing.

**SOUVENIR WEAPONS REGISTERED HERE**

Two Jap machine guns have been registered with A. T. Fletcher, 207 federal building, since persons in possession of foreign firearms were advised last week to register the weapons.

A number of persons also brought in Jap and German automatic pistols but were advised by Fletcher to register them with the sheriff's office, against theft. It is not necessary to register these arms with his office, Fletcher said.

Both machine guns were brought in by out-of-town residents, relatives of men still overseas, who sent the pieces home as souvenirs.

Arrangements have been made by Fletcher with a local acetylene welder to render the guns permanently inoperative. The barrel is solidly welded to the frame and the breach is welded shut. No charge is made to veterans and members of the armed forces for this service.

The main object of this campaign is to keep dangerous arms away from gangsters and persons who might use them for illegal purposes, as well as to prevent accidents, Fletcher said.

# SP RAILROAD WILL INSTALL NEW TRACK

Southern Pacific company is placing orders for approximately \$9,000,000 worth of new steel rail and rail fittings for use next year, enough for relaying 725 miles of track, President A. T. Mercier announced today.

The new rails alone will total 138,000 gross tons, all for heavy-duty and weighing either 113 or 132 pounds per yard. The new installations will replace rail that has been carrying record-breaking war traffic on main tracks in territory extending from New Orleans to Los Angeles, San Francisco, Portland, Ogden.

The rail orders are being divided between the Colorado Fuel and Iron corporation and the Columbia Steel company. Mercier said, and the orders for fittings will be placed with various suppliers.

The daily had printed the first details of fighting between police and pupils of La Plata university. It also had carried the text of a supreme court decision setting free and restoring to the bench a judge whom the government had removed after he liberated federal prisoners.
