

PICKETING OF MOVIE STUDIO SUDDENLY ENDS

HOLLYWOOD, Oct. 10 (AP)—Mass picketing at Warner Brothers movie studio, which had resulted since last Friday morning in injuries to more than 100 persons, suddenly collapsed today when 200 armed sheriff's deputies herded 350 to 400 unresisting pickets into the studio and arrested them on charges of rioting and unlawful assembly.

The pickets, who previously had met opposition with fists and clubs, submitted peacefully on orders of their leader, Herbert Sorrell, head of the AFL Conference of Studio unions and of the jurisdictional strike for control of studio set decorators.

More Tomorrow
"There will be 10 to 20 thousand pickets tomorrow," he said. "We met their delegates last night and members are preparing statements. They are closing down Lockheed until this strike is over."

There was no immediate explanation of his reference to a strike at the Lockheed aircraft plant, where the majority of employees are represented by the AFL Machinists union, and where there have been no strike threats.

Lockheed said today that the union had made no wage demands other than contained in a resolution adopted last month at a mass meeting of employees, requesting 52 hours pay for a 40-hour week. The union contract at Lockheed, it was added, has several more months to run.

Thirty-two thousand employees there are engaged in army contracts for Shooting Star fighter planes, navy bombers and a secret navy contract, and on two commercial transports.

The new situation in the seven months long strike developed suddenly when 25 sheriff's deputies marched two abreast down the center of the street in front of Warner's main gate, to the jeers of the pickets.

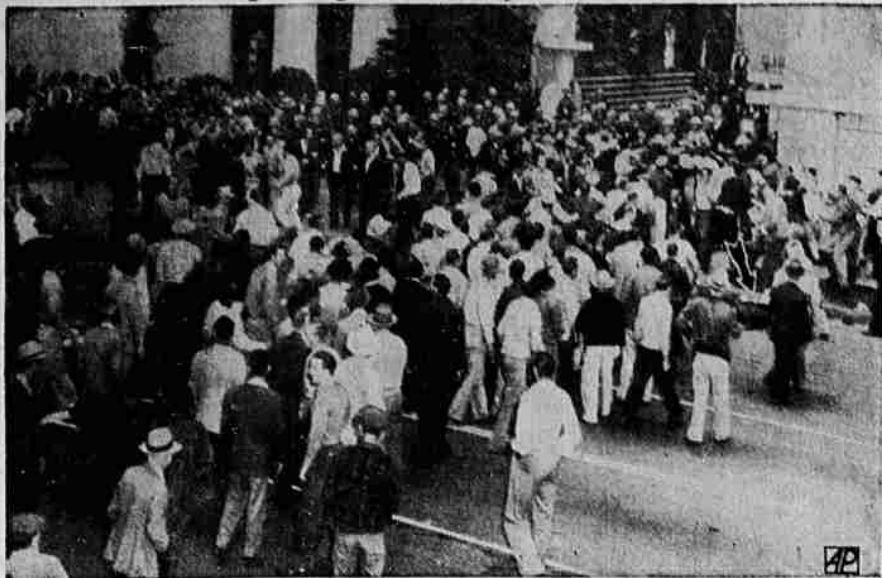
They stood in line before the studio for nearly an hour, while from a sound truck inside the gates came recorded radio music from another station than Warner Brothers.

Deputies Stand By
On a parking lot nearby, 30 plain clothes deputies, including three women, waited quietly. Three of the plain clothes men were armed with Reising machineguns, and tear gas bombs were issued to them.

"We will fill every jail in this damned country if that's what they want," blared the voice of a strike leader from the pickets' sound truck.

"We are enforcing the state law that requires free entrance into a building," Inspector John Henry of the sheriff's department, explained to reporters.

Oregon's Postwar Highway Program To Start Rolling

SALEM, Oct. 10 (AP)—Oregon's \$36,000,000 three-year postwar highway program started rolling today when the state highway commission announced it would open bids in Portland October 29 and 30 on 17 projects costing \$2,500,000.

The commission acted when it got the go-ahead signal from the federal public roads administration. The detailed list of projects to be considered at the meeting will be announced in a day or two.

Of the \$12,000,000 annual cost, the federal government will pay \$7,100,000 and the state \$4,900,000.

There will be \$6,315,000 of the total annual amount spent on primary federal aid highways, \$4,310,000 on the secondary federal aid system, and \$1,375,000 on primary federal aid routes in cities of more than 5000 population.

In addition to this, there will be available \$3,400,000 during each of the three years for forest highways.

The commission's postwar highway job list calls for total expenditure of \$33,600,000, leaving a balance of \$2,400,000 still to be available for jobs not yet planned.

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Norway's Minister To Shuffle Cabinet

OSLO, Oct. 10 (AP)—As a result of the clear-cut victory which his labor party won in Norway's national elections Monday, Prime Minister Einar Gerhardsen is expected to shuffle his cabinet and offer an all-labor government to King Haakon for approval before the end of the month.

Nearly complete returns indicated that the labor party had won a working majority in the 150-seat storting (parliament).

PHOTOSTATIC COPIES COST COUNTY \$1800

Klamath county has spent approximately \$1800 making photostatic copies of legal certificates, at 10 cents a piece, for Klamath veterans since the first of the year.

Photostatic copies of birth certificates, marriage licenses and service discharges have been made without cost to veterans, at the Klamath county courthouse.

Made In Triplicate

Thirty discharges were copied Tuesday and were made in triplicate, making 90 copies, one for the service man, one for the courthouse record and one for the draft board.

Copying discharges was only a minor part of the work of the photostatic department of the courthouse until recently. It has increased tremendously since V-J day.

The photostatic machine takes the place of five girls and requires only one operator. This position is held by Mrs. C. F. DeLapp.

One roll of film makes about 190 records. Each record takes roughly about 10 minutes to complete from the time the pic-

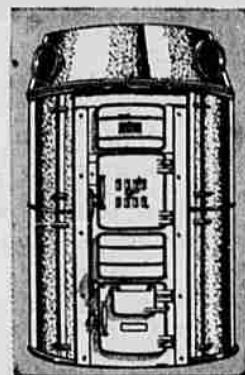

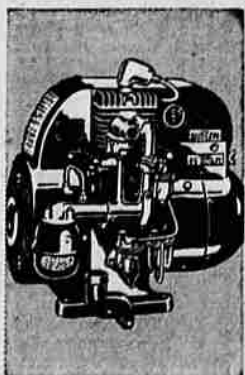

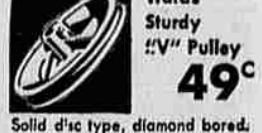
