TWO KILLED WHEN TRAIN JUMPS TRACK

GREAT FALLS, Mont., Oct. 10 (AP)—Two persons were killed and a number of American league baseball players on a barnstorming tour escaped when a southbound Great Northern passenger train was derailed 10 miles north of Great Falls yesterday.

The dead were Arthur F. Killilea, 63, Great Falls engineer who was to have been retired soon after 43 years of service, and Fireman Rodger V. LeRoy, 59, also of Great Falls.

No Passengers Hurt

None of the 80 passengers aboard the train was injured. The American league players continued to Great Falls and played a scheduled exhibition game with an all-star team last night.

The players included Pitcher Bobo Newsom, Babe Keefe, Frank Hays, Sam Chapman and Buddy Roar of the Athletics; Al Evans and Burt Shepard of the Washington Senators; Jim Bucher of the Boston Red Sox; Jeff Heath, Steve Gromek and Allie Reynolds of the Cleveland Indians.

Supt. Henry Shapleigh of the Great Northern said the derailment was caused when the engine struck a piece of steel road drag which had become lodged in the tracks while a farmer was trying to pull it across.

The train was en route from Havre in northern Montana to Great Falls.

School Construction May Be Delayed

EUGENE, Oct. 10 (AP)—Construction of Colin Kelly Jr. junior high school may be delayed again because bids for a gymnasium and several additions were over the estimated \$300,000 mark, Dr. Henry Gunn, Eugene school superintendent, said today.

Originally planned for completion this fall, delay in obtaining materials held up construction, putting Eugene high schools on a double shift.

SYNDICATE TO BUY ALUMINUM PLANTS

WILMINGTON, Del., Oct. 10 (AP)—A financial syndicate prepared to pay \$100,000,000 "if necessary" for all aluminum plants built by the United States during the war has been organized.

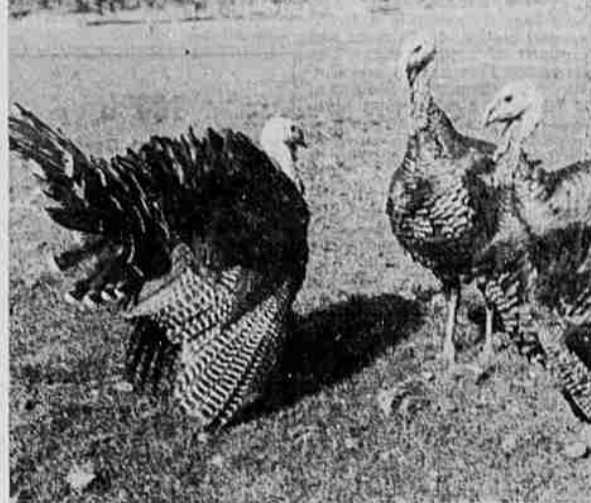
Dr. Francis C. Cary, connected with the research engineer firm of Hybinette and Cary and associates, in revealing formation of the syndicate said its members had already offered \$30,000,000 for the plants.

Cary would not divulge names of the syndicate group. He said the syndicate, by purchasing the U. S.-owned plants, would triple the nation's aluminum output in the first year of operation.

The syndicate will purchase the plants "at their proper value," Cary said, "and operate them as a competitively successful enterprise. There will be no government subsidy in the purchase or operation of these plants.

Message From Relatives Inspires Quick Donation

Community Fund benefits brought home to D. "Shorty" Frazer, proprietor of Frazer's market, 2317 S. 6th, made a difference of \$40 in his 1945 gift contribution.

"Shorty," who was contacted by Marvin Hixon, fund solicitor, had planned to give \$10—"in a day or so."

Yesterday "Shorty" received a letter from relatives in Europe whom he had not heard from for six years. Today he made a contribution of \$50.

"Shorty" made a trip to his home in Italy six years ago. That was the last time he had any word from his relatives until he received this week's letter. He heard then of the terrible time they had during the war. A brother was in a concentration camp four years because he refused to conform to the Mussolini regime.

Nephew Shot A nephew also refusing to conform to a system in which he did not believe, "was shot on the doorstep of his home, and left for dead by the 'Bandits' (Mussolini and Hitler)." Relatives, who came to take charge of the body, found him still alive. Hidden discreetly, he was nursed back to health.

One niece was incarcerated for two months, another niece spent three years in a concentration camp.

Relatives Starved Starving, ill and discouraged, Shorty's relatives were among thousands in prison camps who were ready to give up hope when the Americans came and opened the gates to freedom and new hope.

The American boys fed the people and gave them medical aid, the letter said.

With his donation to the Community Fund, "Shorty" says, "Thank you, American boys, for saving my people."

Argument Over Series Blamed For Stabbing

DENVER, Colo., Oct. 10 (AP)—The fatal stabbing of a Eugene youth in a federal correctional institution was blamed today upon an argument of inmates about the world series.

R. P. Kramer, head of the Denver FBI office, said the stabbing was confessed by Bernard B. Lenhart, 18, inmate of the institution located near Morrison, Colo.

The Eugene youth, Wesley E. Wilson, 19, died Monday night.

NEW PINE CREEK MAN PASSES AWAY

NEW PINE CREEK—The little town of New Pine Creek laid away another of its well-known citizens recently when funeral rites were held for Blumer Ernest McCrary, age 61, after succumbing to the ravages of stomach ulcers from which he had suffered for years, periodically, but which finally ended his life by causing a series of internal hemorrhage.

McCrary died September 18 at Alturas hospital. The community was much grieved by the loss of this neighbor who had done many obliging jobs as a carpenter for nearly everyone in town.

McCrary was a member of the First Baptist church and in the early part of his manhood when he lived on the West Side he was quite active in church and Sunday school work.

Deceased is survived by his mother, Eva McCrary, his wife, Elizabeth, brother, Roscoe, of Canby, Calif., one sister, Mrs. Gracie Oliver, of Torrance, Calif.; nephew, Jim McCrary, and niece, Doris McCrary.

Services were conducted at the local First Baptist church by Rev. Lester A. Myers, of Ft. Bidwell, Calif., and interment was made in the West Side cemetery where other relatives were buried.

BRITAIN'S DOCK STRIKE SPREADS

LONDON, Oct. 10 (AP)—Britain's worst dock strike in 20 years continued to spread today despite a food ministry warning that the tying up of food ships for a few days more would result in a sharp cut in the nation's already meager table supplies.

At least 45 ships loaded with thousands of tons of meat, bacon, cheese, butter, lard and oranges are among 300 vessels lying idle at 15 piers from London to northern Ireland as a result of the unauthorized walkout of 33,000 dockhands during the past two and one-half weeks.

The strikers are demanding 25 shillings (about \$5) a day basic pay, an increase of eight shillings (\$1.60). The present minimum wage scale for dockers is between five and six pounds weekly (\$20 to \$24) but the rates vary with cargo and ports and sometimes they earn up to 40 pounds a week.

Peacetime Building Started At Reedsport

REEDSPORT, Oct. 10 (AP)—Peacetime construction is getting underway here, with six new structures already in the planning stage.

The First National bank of Gardiner will erect a new building to house its offices plus several stores. Other proposed projects include a concrete business structure, a feed store, an addition to the Reedsport Creamery and Cheese company plant, and two additional buildings, the nature of which has not been disclosed.

American, British Groups Blasted By Moscow Radio

LONDON, Oct. 10 (AP)—The Moscow radio accused "Influential" but unnamed American and British groups today of working to preserve the "military and economic might of Germany."

The broadcast asserted that some representatives of allied administrations in Germany were encouraging the restoration of the German war potential and were backed by big groups of politicians and industrialists in the United States and Great Britain.

"They cloak their proceedings under benevolent intentions, such as if Germany is reduced to the rank of a second rate power industrially, then Europe as a whole will lose much of its cultural development," the broadcast said. "This is an utterly false basis."
