

Eight Old Men And Boy Cop Series For Detroit

Cubs Run Out Of Pitchers As Grimm Uses Borowy For Third Straight Time

CHICAGO, Oct. 11 (AP)—Baseball's takeoff on the nine old men—eight old men and a boy in this case—brought the world championship back to Detroit today for the first time in 10 years, all because the Chicago Cubs ran out of gas and pitchers against the Tiger trigger-men in the clutch.

That, plus some of the fanciest flinging of this fall frolics by Lefty Hal Newhouse, for a new series strikeout record for seven games, meant the ball game and the set in the finale yesterday. Prince Hal was the boy in the cast—he is 24—and the boy turned out to be quite a man as he backed up his second win of the scramble.

That was the story in yesterday's 9 to 3 payoff. Jolly Cholly Grimm was so desperate for pitchers, after using most of them Sunday and Monday, he finally had to reach into the bar-

Seals Whip Suds, 6-1; Even Series

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 11 (AP)—Back on their home field, the San Francisco Seals squared the Pacific coast league Governors' cup playoff final at two games apiece by beating the Seattle Rainiers 6-1 last night.

The victory gave Frank Seaward, No. 2 Seal pitcher, revenge for his defeat at the hands of aging Carl Fischer in the first game of the series. The tall, handsome right-hander held the Rainiers to six hits as his teammates were shelling Fischer from the mound with a four-run attack in the fifth inning.

Joyce To Pitch

Tonight 31-game winner Bob Joyce, who gave San Francisco its first triumph over Seattle last Saturday, will again take the mound against Farmer Hal Turpin.

Seven doubles, five by the Seals and two by the Rainiers, rattled off the outfield fences in last night's free-hitting contest.

The O'Doulmen went out in front in the second inning when Ray Perry rapped out a long two-bagger to left center and scored on Roy Nicely's double to left.

Seattle got its only tally in the first of the fifth when Hal Patchett came in from first on Bill Matheson's two-baser off the left field wall.

Big Fifth Frame

San Francisco's big fifth frame spurge that spelled curtains for Fischer included three doubles, a single and long fly to center, good for four runs. One of the two-baggers, by Ben Guintini, carried to the scoreboard in center field for the longest inside-the-park hit made at the Seals' stadium this year.

Three San Francisco singles in the next inning off Reliever Glenn Elliott netted another run, and ended the scoring for the night.

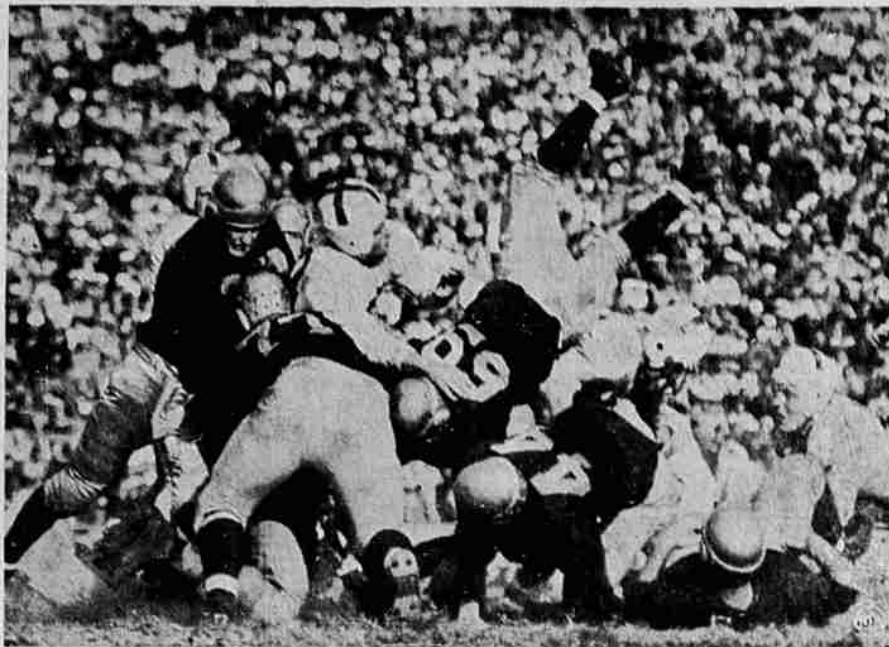

Jolly Cholly Saddest Man In Town As Detroit Wins

CHICAGO, Oct. 11 (AP)—The saddest man in town today is Manager Charlie Grimm of the Chicago Cubs who was completely crushed by the Detroit Tigers' world series triumph.

When a guy like Jolly Cholly, one of baseball's most beloved personalities, forgets to go to the dressing room to congratulate a winning rival you know he's sick way down.

Grimm wasn't in the gang of backslappers that rushed into the Tiger's lair after their clinching 9-3 victory yesterday. Charley was covering his sorrow with a grin in his own clubhouse, trying to cheer up his battered Bruins.

It was bitter gall for this affable manager, who once before had lost to those same Tigers in the 1935 series and whose 1932 Cubs were belted out of the lot by the New York Yankees. He wanted to win this one more than he wanted anything in his life. It would have been a brilliant climax to a thorny managerial career.

For seven years—from 1932 to 1938—Grimm's Cubs never finished in the second division, but he walked the plank in 1938 and tumbled into the American association as boss of the Milwaukee Brewers. Then, with the 1944 season scarcely underway, the Cubs called him back.

1945 Series Sets Record Money Mark

CHICAGO, Oct. 11 (AP)—The record receipts of \$1,592,454, including \$100,000 for broadcasting rights, for the seven-game world series showdown raised the total take in the 42 world series played thus far to almost \$30,000,000.

The Tigers with 31 slices apportioned may top the record individual winning player's share of \$4,544.76 received by each Tiger in the 1935 series with the Cubs. Excluding the player take from the \$100,000 radio fee, each Tiger figures to get approximately \$6,123. The Cubs, voting 33 shares, will catch around \$4,277 each.

Huge Throng Greets Tigers Upon Arrival In Detroit

DETROIT, Oct. 11 (AP)—The Detroit Tigers, dog tired but hilarious after dragging down baseball's richest prize by beating the Chicago Cubs in the world series, arrived home just before 1 a. m. today to find a milling mob of fully 10,000 fans—and all—staging an impromptu victory celebration in and around Union station.

Although the Tigers' special train, bearing the club home from Chicago, was more than an hour late the throng that jammed the depot and filled Fort and Third streets for a block each way continued to swell with pennant-waving, horn-toting celebrants even as the players were hustled along a police-lined aisle to waiting taxicabs.

Manager Steve O'Neill, who hasn't had a team in the world series since he caught for the Cleveland Indians' championship outfit of 1920, couldn't believe his eyes when he first saw the wall of humanity through which police blazed a trail to the sidewalk.

"There's nothing in the world like it," O'Neill marvelled. "Now there's a reception. They love us, don't they?"

Wild cheers arose from the crowd as their heroes came in view — O'Neill, Newhouse, Greenberg, Richards, York, Trout.

Players, many of them accompanied by their wives, grinned, waved and yelled with the rest but were glad to get out of reach of the jostling crowd.

Interrupting the celebrating long enough to grab a night's sleep, the Tigers scattered to their homes to reconvene tonight for an official salute at a victory banquet sponsored by the Detroit board of commerce.

Banquet officials invited 1000 privileged Tiger followers to dine with their heroes—at \$10 a plate.

Wildcats Edge Out G.P., 13-7

Bud Brown, Jerry Schubert Rack Up 2 Touchdowns For Klamath To Overcome Lead

Holding the KUHS Wildcats by the tail for three quarters benefited Grants Pass' junior Cavemen very little when the 'Cats exploded in the fourth period to win their first game of the current season 13-7 Wednesday on Modoc Field.

Even after losing three games earlier this season, the Wildcats were able to upset the dope bucket and edge the favored Grants Pass eleven by one touchdown. Both teams seemed pretty fairly matched in the game until the last stanza when Klamath broke loose with a scoring attack that left the opposition far behind.

Brown Leads Attack

Lead by 'Cat fullback Bud Brown, Klamath rolled to Grants Pass' three, and Brown went around left end to tie the Caveboys' 6-0 margin scored in the first quarter. This one and only Grants Pass touchdown came when Jack Crafts snagged a pass in the end zone. However, the 'Cats conversion put them one point ahead of Grants Pass previous score.

Endeavoring to chalk up another touchdown, Grants Pass immediately drove to Klamath's 25, only to lose the ball on a fumble. Then the 'Cats again turned on the steam, this time going to the 50, from where Jerry Schubert, also a 'Cat fullback, made a spectacular run to go over the line standing up. Don Johnson's conversion followed.

Touchdown Called Back

Not quite, but almost, was Alvy Boyce's sprint from Klamath's 35 in the second quarter. Boyce, Grants Pass quarterback, reached the end zone, but the run was called back and a 15-yard penalty imposed on the Caveboys for clipping. Grants Pass was not able to even threaten during the rest of the game.

The Notre Dame box with a shift into the single wing and occasionally a variation of the T-formation were the standard types of play employed by the junior Cavemen when they tangled with the Wildcats. Reverses were also used to good advantage by Grants Pass in the early part of the game.

There is no game scheduled for next week for the Wildcats, although one is being arranged. Merrill is the next regular game on the 'Cats list, October 26.

They have left their mark on three of the northwest's top courses—Indian canyon at Spokane, in the Esmeralda Open; Portland Golf club in the Portland Open, and Fircrest in Tacoma's Open event. They are off today at Seattle's Broadmoor, a 6327-yard, par 36-34 layout.

What may happen to the course's long fairways and tricky putting carpets was hinted in practice rounds, with Sgt. Jim Ferrier of San Francisco and Harold "Jug" McSpaden of San Francisco, Me., turning up with 64 and several others notching 68s.
