

SALVAGED FATS STILL IMPORTANT

Salvaged fats, so important in war, are most important also in the reconversion program, according to Winnifred K. Gillen, home demonstration agent. It is unlikely that any appreciable supply of oils will be received from areas surrendered by the Japanese for some time to come, she observed.

The fat salvage program must be continued for the present. The war production board is concerned that there be no let-down in the drive for maximum used-fat collections, Mrs. Gillen reported.

Tillamook Blaze Clouds City Water

FOREST GROVE, Oct. 12 (AP)—A system to prevent cloudy water—by-product of the giant Tillamook fire—from running out of Forest Grove faucets is almost complete.

Since the forest fire, this town's water supply—drawn from ash-filled streams in the burned area—has been cloudy. A 1400-foot stretch of eight-inch pipe is now being laid to Deep Creek, which is not in the burned area. The system will enable the water department to shut off valves from clouded creeks.

BOEING AIRCRAFT RECALLS EMPLOYEES

SEATTLE, Oct. 12 (AP)—Boeing Aircraft company today announced it was recalling employees to resume production of what remains of its B-29 Superfortress contract.

"Company estimates call for 1000 direct-production workers and 800 tool-fabrication employees being back on the job at plant 2 by November 15," said Operations Manager R. A. Neale. "It is estimated that between 300 and 400 factory workers will be back at the Renton plant by the latter part of December."

The main floor of plant 2 here is being cleared for jobs of the C-97 military-transport version of the B-29, so final assemblies of B-29s will be done at Renton. Plant 2 fabrication shops are starting work on experimental and modification parts and some C-97 orders.

PETITION BROUGHT BY AFL DISMISSED

WASHINGTON, Oct. 12 (AP)—The national labor relations board today dismissed an AFL petition to become bargaining agent for operating engineers in two Astoria fish packing plants. The board ruled that operating engineers in the two plants—Paragon Packing company and

Columbia River Packers association—were not skilled craftsmen and consequently not eligible for separate bargaining. The majority of workers in the plants are members of the CIO Columbia River Fishermen's Protective union. The petition was brought by the AFL International Union of Operating Engineers. The term "Kaffir," used to cover all natives in South Africa, came down from the East Coast by way of the Portuguese and is an Arab word meaning "unbeliever."
