

CAVEMEN TRIP PELICANS, 13-12

Aerial Attack Accounts For Grants Pass Victory

Klamath Eleven Outgains Opposition; Redkey Races 56 Yards For Touchdown

GRANTS PASS, Oct. 13 (Special)—The Klamath Pelicans lost a heartbreaker, 13-12, here last night to a hard-charging and alert Grants Pass high school football eleven.

Far outgaining their opponents in yardage and first downs, the Pelicans failed to capitalize several scoring threats and in the pinch it was Cavemen passes that brought Klamath's downfall.

That one-point margin of victory for the Cavemen came in the last quarter, after they had knotted the score at 12 all. On the conversion, Grants Pass faked a place-kick, and Halfback Everton took the ball and tossed it to Right End Bertrand in the end zone. That aerial play cost Klamath the ball game.

Although the Pelicans found themselves behind at the end of the first quarter, they quickly tied the score at 6-all at the half, and early in the third quarter they went out front 12-6 in the direction of what seemed certain victory. Then came the final Caveman touchdown and the aerial conversion.

Late in the first quarter, after an exchange of punts, Grants Pass got the ball on its own 42. Two 20-yard gains on passes, with Lutz throwing the ball and Moser receiving, ate up those 58 yards and gave G.P. its first touchdown. The conversion kick failed.

Touchdown Center
In the second quarter, Bob Redkey of Klamath caught a Caveman punt on his own 44. Near the sideline at the catch, he raced down the stripe all the 56 yards for a touchdown. It was a magnificent run at headlong speed, aided and abetted by fancy Pelican blocking in the broken field. Coleman's dropkick failed for the conversion.

Klamath continued to dominate the play through that half, making gobbs of yardage in mid-field but slowing down when the heavier Grants Pass line stiffened near its goal line. Klamath got to the 3-yard line of the Cavemen just before the half. A pass to Klamath's Whitt in the end zone was momentarily in Whitt's hands, but he dropped it when he was tackled. The half ended, 6-6.

Klamath got a break at the start of the second half, when Caveman Everton fumbled on the GP 20. Klamath recovered, and Tommy Edwards, who had a great night of ground-gaining, galloped to the Grants Pass 1 on a long run. Quarterback Coleman sneaked through for the score that put the Pelicans ahead.

It was in the fourth quarter that disaster hit the Klamaths. They had threatened again, but were set back by penalties and were forced to kick. The punt was partially blocked, and was deflected to the sideline. The bouncing ball was picked up on the dead run by the Caveman Star Halfback Lutz. With two Pelicans trailing him all the way, he flashed 55 yards to the touchdown zone, and the pass conversion put GP ahead.

Five minutes remained, and there was still time for Klamath to score and win the ball game. The Pelicans opened a desperate aerial attack, with Tommy Edwards flinging the apple. He completed one for 5 and one for 25, the latter putting Klamath on the Caveman 30.

Passes Fail
But a series of pass failures and penalties set the Klamaths way back, and the game ended with the ball in Grants Pass possession in mid-field. In the final wild minutes of the ball game, the Cavemen also managed to threaten, getting to the Klamath 15 before a pass failure gave the Pelicans the ball and Edwards began his almost-successful aerial campaign.

Doped as the underdogs, the Cavemen played their best ball of the season against Klamath and showed increasing power as the game went along. Their line stiffened when stiffening was needed to thwart Klamath's threats, and Lutz was always a wild man in the backfield.

Klamath Dominates
Klamath dominated most of the game, however, and ran up 14 first downs to 4 for the Cavemen. Wide runs with laterals for the Pelicans, but too much of it went on in mid-field and not enough near the Caveman goal line. Bob Redkey had a great night defensively as well as offensively. On one occasion, he smacked a Caveman ball carrier, who promptly lateraled to another Caveman. Redkey deflected the first man and took the second, making two great tackles in one play.

Klamath Halfback Barker received a painful leg injury early in the game and saw no more action. Whitt, a newcomer, played a lot of good ball for the Pelicans.

The Klamath starting lineup included Nelson, Foust, Wirth, Vanderhoff, Eastman, Thompson, Thurman, Coleman, Redkey, Barker and Edwards. Substitutions included Pope, Craig, Moebe, Rose and Eck, Reed, Holloway, Whitt, Dodson,

Black Tornado Rolls Over Eureka By Score Of 38-0

The card file of Oregon's district title contenders underwent a reshuffling today in the wake of prep gridiron games that pitched several squads off the undefeated list.

Hillsboro skidded from title hopes with a 14-7 defeat by McMinnville's Grizzlies. The contest — matching two unbeaten teams ranked as top contenders for district 3's northern division title — McMinnville over the toughest hurdle on its schedule. The Grizzlies, unbeaten and with a string of pushover opponents ahead of them, now rank as the dopest's bet for the division laurels.

Portland's Central Catholic, previously unbeaten in the same division, collapsed to a 28-0 whipping by Corvallis. Columbia Prep of Portland, however, hung on to an undefeated record with a 37-0 whitewash of the feeble Parkrose squad that's lost every game this season.

Corvallis and Eugene were still riding the victory train as title contenders in District 3's southern division. Eugene's Thursday 7-0 defeat of Albany beat Prineville by more than double the score last week.

But Hood River moved further along the title trail yesterday, defeating Gresham, 25 to 12.

Jefferson upset Portland Prep dopesters by going wild to blank highly favored Washington, 21-0. Grant, downing Lincoln 47-6, moved into first place as the only unbeaten Portland squad.

Medford's Black Tornado continued toward a second straight state championship, whitewashing Eureka, Calif., 38-0 and piling up a four-game aggregate of 198.

Cavemen Win
A Springfield eleven with just a mediocre record tossed Roseburg from the unbeaten ranks, 13-12. Grants Pass edged out its neck-and-neck rival of Klamath Falls to win the Cavemen's first southern Oregon conference tilt, 13-12.

Upset of the week came with a team which doesn't even enter title talk. Thrice-defeated St. Helens overpowered, 14-13, a top-notch Camas, Wash., squad which has registered victories over some of Oregon's best elevens.

Paper statisticians leaped on The Dalles 20 Prineville 0 score and promptly calculated that The Dalles isn't as dangerous a contender for the eastern Oregon title as Hood River. Hood River beat Prineville by more than double the score last week.

Nelson Holds One-Stroke Lead Over Givan In Open

SEATTLE, Oct. 13 (AP)—Far down under the leafy weeping willows of Broadmoor park was hiding today from the pair of tall and serious gentlemen who cut the post old standard to ribbons yesterday for the second time in the \$10,250 Seattle Open golf tournament.

Harry Givan, the Seattle amateur whose game has earned the friendly envy of duration national Amateur Champion Marvin "Bud" Ward, rambled over Broadmoor's 6327 yards in 65 strokes after going the route Thursday in 66. His 131 was nine under the par 70-70-140.

Byron Nelson of Toledo had all he could do to stay one knock ahead of the red-hot hometown-

er. He had a couple of bad holes, his drive landing in a bush to cost him a stroke on the first hole and three putts nicking him for another on 11, but four birdies kept him well ahead of par.

With his 62-68-130, he returned to the form that made him the top money winner of the year, with nearly \$60,000 in war bonds to date. In the Portland and Tacoma tourneys he was badly off his game, and he said the Tacoma event last week was his first time over par for a tournament since the Portland Open a year ago.

Forty-nine amateurs, seven of them amateurs, qualified for the final 36 holes.

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Seals Edge Suds, 6-5; Cop Playoff

Bay City Club Stages 9th-Inning Rally To Take Set Four Games Out Of Six

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 13 (AP)—San Francisco's Seals slammed their way to a third straight Pacific Coast league Governor's Cup playoff championship last night with a dramatic ninth-inning rally that defeated the Seattle Rainiers 6-5 and gave the bay city club the series four games out of six.

The victory was the Seals' third in a row over the Rainiers and won them the \$10,000 "Pot of Gold" going to the winner of the finals. Seattle, as runner-up, netted \$5,000. Portland and Sacramento, the other two clubs in the playoffs, each got \$2,500. Equal Record

By annexing the cup for the third year in succession, San Francisco equaled the record of consecutive wins set by Seattle in 1940-41-42.

Hero of the series was Neil Sheridan, Seal right fielder, who provided the payoff punch for the second straight night.

Trailing by one run going into the last of the ninth, the Seals had knotted the count at five-all and had men on first and second with two away when Sheridan stepped to the plate. The husky outfielder came through with a sharp single to left that brought in Gus Sühr with the winning tally. Thursday night Sheridan powered San Francisco to victory in the last half of the ninth by breaking a 4-4 deadlock with a three-run homer.
