

# FIVE PERSONS FATALLY HURT OVER WEEKEND

PORTLAND, Oct. 15 (AP)—Five persons were killed in weekend highway accidents in Oregon, four on fog-bound roads.

Two Portland men, Floyd C. Tiden and Benjamin H. Reed, were injured fatally yesterday when their panel truck crashed head-on in the fog with a car driven by Les Hughes, Lebanon, on highway 20 just north of Lebanon.

Three other cars crashed into the wreckage of the first two autos, but only one driver was injured.

State police reported Charles E. Hamilton, 32, Albany, was killed when his auto overturned near Millersburg on a foggy highway.

Mrs. Margaret Ann Deuchar, 35, was killed late Saturday when struck by a car driven by Jack Leuthold, who told police the woman jumped in front of the auto as he approached her in the fog. At first unidentified, the woman's body was claimed 15 hours later by her husband, Dale Deuchar, who reported his wife missing after they separated at a Milwaukie tavern.

Fifteen-year-old Patricia Siler, Portland, was injured fatally Saturday night in the city. She and two other passengers were thrown from an open car as it careened out of control and overturned. Her death was the 49th traffic fatality of 1945. The toll stood at 29 the same date last year.

## VICTORY FLEET SAILS THROUGH GOLDEN GATE

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 15 (AP)—Admiral William F. Halsey and units of his victorious 3rd fleet came home from the Japanese today.

At 11:45 a. m. (PST) the battleship South Dakota with the indomitable Halsey on the bridge, passed Mile Rock at the entrance to the Golden Gate, and steamed slowly through dense fog into the great harbor.

Many thousands of San Franciscans moved early to vantage places from which to watch the Victory fleet move through the Golden Gate and into the great harbor.

The city had elaborate plans for entertainment of the officers and men of the fleet.

Battle craft of the 3rd fleet returning with Admiral Halsey were his flagship, the USS South Dakota; three other battleships, the Alabama, Wisconsin and Colorado; the light cruiser Vickaburg, the destroyers De Haven, Samuel M. Moore and Blue, and the submarines Puffer, Baya, Kraken, Loggerhead, Pilotfish and Stickleback.

On hand to greet Halsey as he brings the units of the powerful 3rd fleet which played a major part in bringing Japan to its knees was Fleet Admiral Nimitz. Halsey's flagship, the powerful South Dakota, will precede the long line of ships into the harbor, take its position and review the submarines, destroyers, cruisers and other battleships in that order.

# REDS ABOLISH HUGE MILITARY TANK INDUSTRY

MOSCOW, Oct. 15 (AP)—The huge military tank industry of the soviet union which did so much to win the war, was abolished and its personnel transferred to a new commissariat for transport machine building by decree today.

This, the biggest peace news since two orders were issued for demobilization of a large section of the red army, was believed to have a possible bearing on the USSR's request of the United States for a \$8,000,000,000 loan.

Visiting U. S. congressmen in a meeting with Generalissimo Stalin recently asked him what the money would be spent for—peacetime or military industry.

**Biggest in Russia**  
The tank industry headed by Col. Gen. V. A. Malyshev was one of the biggest in Russia. Its many thousands of employees were engaged in plants stretching from the western areas to central Siberia. Its headquarters was in the Ural.

Malyshev now becomes director of the new commissariat for transport machine building with the job of converting tank workers into builders of thousands of locomotives, freight cars, passenger coaches and buses.

The new commissariat has been formed with the object of giving the soviet union its great-

est transport system in Russian history.

Malyshev is a member of the central committee of the communist party and has been decorated for his organizing ability.
