Oregon's Loss To OSC, UCLA Win Over Bears Are Conference Puzzles

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 15 (AP)—West coast football fans took a fresh grip today and decided to be prepared for any kind of a gridiron happening this week-end in view of the upsets that crowded last Saturday's slate.

If San Diego Naval Training Station's 33 to 6 win over the University of Southern California was not as shocking as the score would indicate the result of the Oregon State-Oregon contest at least fell as a surprise to many.

Martinelli To Grapple "Grey Mask"

Angelo Martinelli, the Buckeye blockbuster, will have the dubious pleasure of bending bones with the "Grey Mask" in the top tussle on Promoter Mack Lillard's crunch card Friday night at the Klamath arena.

Martinelli, who apparently doesn't know when he is well off, requested Lillard for the bout with the hooded hoodlum. He has proven popular here in previous tiffs and displayed real razzling ability so Mack has given him the green light for a joust with Mr. Stoneface.

In his first appearance here for many months on the card last week, the "Mask" was just as hard to get along with as ever, although he was on the way to a severe drubbing by Jack Lipscomb when the fight was stopped.

Last week's show had a little bit of everything and was climaxed when Lipscomb put the chill on Referee Wally Moss and Wally awarded the bout to Mr. Stoneface.

Moss had his work cut out for him last week and turned in a fine job of officiating. In the final fracas, he was forced to do more than a little tussling himself when he was attacked by both grapplers.

Lillard has decided to penalize Lipscomb for his overt action against the referee and Jack will probably not appear on the Friday's bill.

Other matches have not been lined up as yet, but Lillard hopes to announce the semi-windup to-morrow.

Willamette River Fish Ladder Fixed

OREGON CITY, Oct. 15 (AP)—The Willamette river fish ladder here, in disrepair for more than a decade, was in perfect condition today—in plenty of time for the fall silverside salmon run.

Repair work cost the fish commission \$5000.

How an Oregon State eleven that was lapped the week before, 33 to 0 by Washington State, could bounce back to trounce a favored Oregon squad, 19-6, was the day's puzzler.

Followers of the California Bears could hardly justify their team's 18-0 defeat by the University of California at Los Angeles considering the Bears took the measure of Washington, 27-14 the week before.

Washington, meanwhile, made a winning comeback by hurdlng Washington State's powerhouse, 6-0, Saturday.

This week-end Washington tests the newly found strength of Oregon State in a coast conference engagement. Washington State and Oregon come together in another league clash as do Idaho and Montana. Idaho lost to the Camp Farragut, Idaho, Navy 18-7, last week.

The UCLA Bruins and St. Mary's Navy Pre-Flight lead off the program with a contest in Los Angeles Friday night. Other Saturday encounters bring together weak College of the Pacific with Southern California, and Fresno State with the Santa Barbara Marines. Nevada travels to Tulsa for a game after its 19-14 win over the Santa Barbara Marines. Sunday's big game will pit the El Toro Marines against San Diego Naval Station on the latter's field.

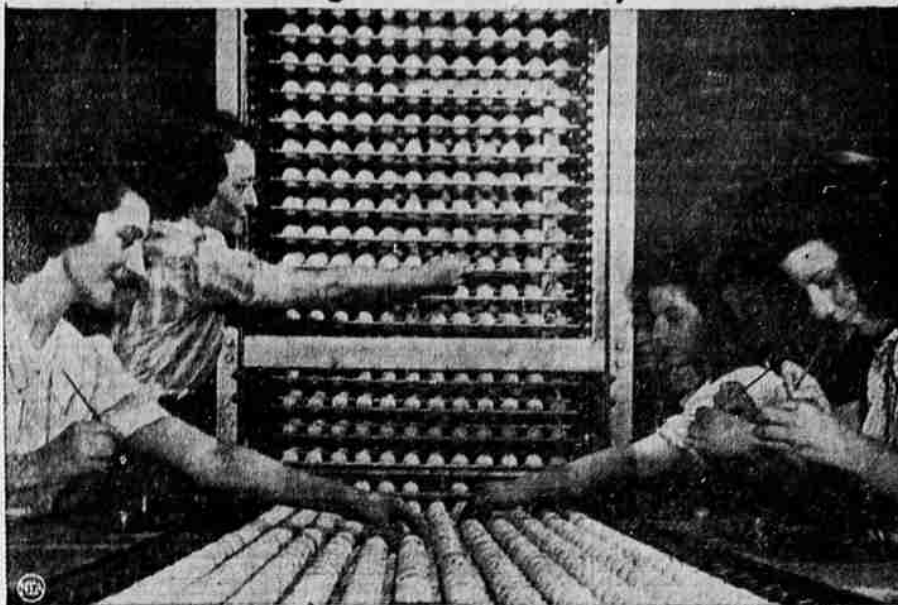
Last week's conference results left Southern California at the top of the pile with two wins and no defeats—its loss to the San Diego Sailors having no bearing on the championship race.

The stand-up club last week proved to be St. Mary's college, Coach Jimmy Phelan's crack outfit, paced by Hawaiian Herman Wedemeyer, swamped College of the Pacific, 61-0. Wedemeyer, stamped by every expert, who has watched him pass, run and place-kick as the best halfback to show up in a long time, played only during the opening two periods. Substitutes completed the rout after the first team had piled up a 28-0 lead.

Billy Canfield, Purdue—scored three touchdowns, one on a 41-yard run, and carried the ball 13 times for 131 yards in 40-0 rout of Iowa.

George Clark, Duke—ripped off touchdown runs of 63, 58 and 7 yards to lead the Blue Devils to 26-19 victory over Wake Forest.

Glenn Davis and Felix (Doc) Blanchard, Army—accounted for most of Army's yardage in 28-7 triumph over Michigan with Blanchard scoring two touchdowns, one on a 68-yard dash, and Davis running 70 yards for a goal.

Gene Rossides, Columbia—had a hand in all of Columbia's tallies against Yale and passed directly for two of the touchdowns in leading Columbia to a 27-13 conquest.

Cal Rossi, UCLA—Ran up 101 yards from scrimmage and tallied both markers in a 13-0 defeat of California.

Gordon Hungar, Washington—intercepted a pass and shortly afterward broke away for a 41-yard scoring dash to upset Washington State 6-0.

Mel (Tommy Gun) Tommervik, San Diego Navy—carried for three touchdowns and passed for two others to beat Southern California 33-6.

YANKS INTRODUCE GUARD DANVERS, Mass.—Big league baseball introduced a one-armed outfielder in Pete Gray of the Browns, and now the Boston Yanks are bringing into major football Ellis Jones, who lost an arm when infection set in after he broke it falling from a tree when he was 11. All state at Abilene, Tex., Jones captained San Angelo Junior college and Tulsa, where he played in two Sugar Bowl and an Orange Bowl game. He played his second All-Star game at Soldier's field, Chicago, the other night and was on All-American teams last fall. The Yanks are undergoing pre-season workouts at St. John's Preparatory school here.

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Substitute In Role Of UW Hero

Gordon Hungar Broke Away For Only Tally Late In Washington Rivalry Game

SEATTLE, Oct. 15 (AP)—The talk of the campus at the University of Washington today was 180-pound Gordon Hungar, of Lake Stevens, up Everett way, who, with only five minutes of college football to his credit, became the star of the traditional big game between Washington State Saturday.

Hungar, who previously had seen brief action in the California game, broke away in the final minutes of the deadlock contest on an off-tackle slant, reversed his field with all the class of a veteran and raced into the clear to score Washington's winning touchdown for Washington State's first defeat.

The contest ended a few minutes later, Washington 6, Washington State 0.

Coach Pest Welch announced that Freshman Hungar will be given every chance to break into the starting lineup. "We need plenty of speed and the boy has it," he said.

Another Everett lad, War Veteran Joe Trask showed tremendous improvement Saturday and appears a fixture as first string halfback.

Norm Sansregret, Bellingham's young right halfback, came up with the most serious injury Saturday. He sustained a split hip muscle during the third quarter and will have to take it easy for a few days.

Joe Louis Signs For June Fight With Billy Conn

NEW YORK, Oct. 15 (AP)—Heavyweight Champion Joe Louis today signed a contract to defend his title in June, 1946, under the auspices of Promoter Mike Jacobs.

The champion agreed to meet Billy Conn, now considered the leading contender, or any other suitable opponent designated by Jacobs. The exact date and the site of the bout will be set by Jacobs at least 40 days prior to the fight.

In addition, Louis agreed that he will not engage in any boxing match or exhibition prior to the June bout without the written consent of the promoter.

Lloyd Mangrum Cops GI Golf Tournament

Underdogs Make Shambles Of Pro Grid Favorites

CHICAGO, Oct. 15 (AP)—Pre-season predictions all the way across the National Football league's territory have been blasted to a shambles, and pre-season favorites are talking about comebacks—almost before the 1945 schedule has been decided.

Only two teams remained on the undefeated list—and one of those had a tie to blight its record—after yesterday's blitzkrieg by the underdogs.

Cleveland's Rams knocked Green Bay out of the unbeaten class, and held their own record clear, by slamming across three last-quarter touchdowns for a 27-14 victory. Boston's Yanks still

are unbeaten but they settled for a 13-13 tie with New York yesterday to dampen the Giants' title hopes.

The Philadelphia Eagles went down before the Detroit Lions, 28 to 24. Chicago's Bears were humbled, 16-7, by their cross-town rivals, the Chicago Cardinals—first victory for the latter in their last 30 games. Washington beat Pittsburgh, 14-0.

The biggest upset, perhaps, was Green Bay's loss to Cleveland, although Detroit's win over Philadelphia's eastern division entry was also quite a surprise.
