KLAMATH FALLS MAN AWARDED BRONZE STAR

First Lt. J. David Totton, husband of Mrs. Joan R. Totton, 535 N. 3rd, has been awarded the Bronze Star medal for meritorious service in connection with military operations against the enemy as platoon leader, anti-tank company, 355th Infantry division, 89th Infantry division, during the period March 11 to May 7, 1945, in Germany, according to headquarters, 89th Infantry division, European theater.

"During the hazardous crossings of the Moselle and Rhine rivers and the subsequent pursuit of the enemy across central Germany," the citation reads, "1st Lt. Totton labored tirelessly with his men clearing the mined areas for the advancing troops, particularly from March 28 to March 29 along the east bank of the Rhine river."

"On March 26, when his battalion was temporarily halted in a defile by hostile automatic weapons fire that covered the mined area, he led his men under the cover of supporting fires and promptly cleared the area, thereby enabling his battalion to advance with a minimum of casualties."

"Another mine field was located near Rudesheim, Germany, on March 27. He moved his men to the location and removed the mines while being subjected to sporadic enemy fire."

"His leadership, initiative, courage and devotion to duty reflected great credit upon him and were in keeping with the best traditions of the armed forces of the United States."

He also held that when an out-of-state resident applies for a loan in Oregon, the Oregon laws apply.
