

COUNTIES MUST PAY SHARES OF WELFARE COSTS

SALEM, Oct. 18 (AP) — Counties are obligated to pay their shares of public welfare costs, Attorney General George Neuner ruled today for the state public welfare commission in two opinions based on the failure of Columbia county to pay its full share.

Neuner pointed out that the law forces each county to levy a tax large enough to pay 40 per cent of the state-county total costs of old age assistance, aid to blind and aid to dependent children in the county.

Rules and regulations made by the commission to fix statewide uniform standards also are binding upon the counties, he ruled.

Duty of County
"The duty of the county to provide funds and contribute them to the state and county public welfare commissions is to cooperate with the state public welfare commission in the administration of general assistance under the terms of the public welfare act, to levy and collect a sufficient sum to meet the cost of public assistance according to standards fixed by the state public welfare commission; and to make the tax so collected available for the purpose for which it was levied."

Neuner also ruled that a county court cannot use money for
