OPA INSTRUCTED IN TIRE RATIONING
A. M. Bobbitt of the office of price administration, Portland office is assisting officials and local boards of this district in the fair distribution of their limited quotas of passenger car tires among the large numbers of applicants.
As long as the present acute tire shortage exists, it is vital that local boards in all cases determine first that a tire is actually necessary to the continued use of the applicant's car and second that the car is indispensable to the applicant in continuing his occupation because of the nature or place of his work.
In addition, boards are supplied with occupation preference lists to be used as guides in issuing tire certificates. These lists are helpful when used properly but the tire needs of an applicant who has no other means of getting to his job or performing it should always take precedence over the needs of a car owner who has access to other means of transportation.
