Soroptimists Hear Speaker

Frank Jenkins, publisher of the Herald and News, spoke to Soroptimist members and guests at luncheon Thursday in the Pelican party room. Mr. Jenkins drew a graphic picture of conditions as he found them in the European countries which he recently visited. He said the cities throughout Germany were just heaps of rubble and the poverty and lack of the necessities of life were heart rending to witness.

"Anyone who has not seen the ruin and desolation that have been wrought by this war, simply cannot realize what it is like in those countries," he said. The thing that impressed him most perhaps was the lack of any laughter, that the only laughter he heard was occasionally among the GI's Mr. Jenkins closed his talk by saying that we should not be misled by thinking that any of the various "isms" that have sprung up in Europe in the past few years were an improvement on our own democratic government; that while superior to anything they have over there that we should all be very grateful for what we have here.

Another interesting feature of the luncheon was the initiation of four new members, Izola Parker, Jewel Cantrall, Ruth Hattan and Madge Long. Alice Howard read the initiation ceremony and Alice Lamm presented each new member with a lovely corsage in the club colors, and welcomed them into membership.

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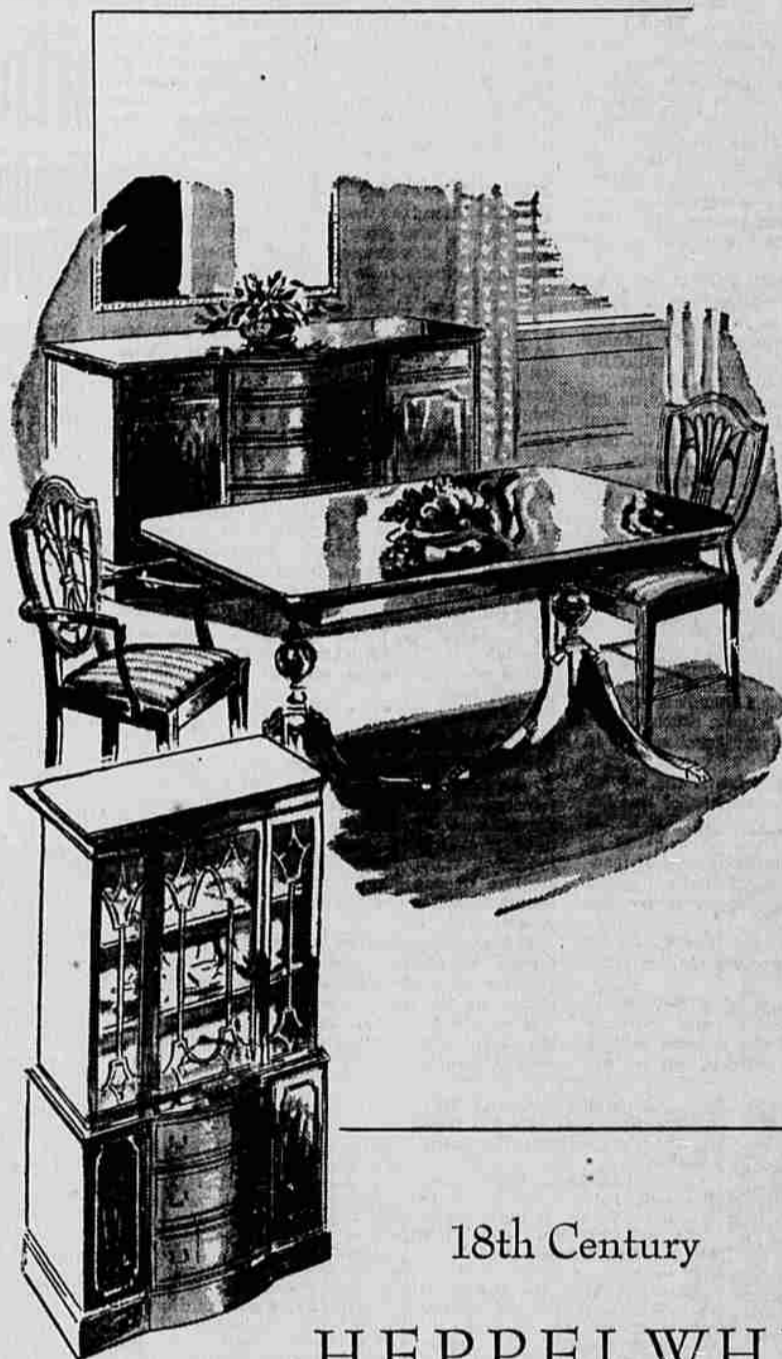
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
