Tornado Assault Wrecks Klamath Victory Hopes Early In Opening Frame

Medford On Way To 1945 Crown; Champs Display Finest Prep Ball Ever Seen On Local Gridiron

With probably the finest display of prep school football ever unleashed on Medford field, Medford's Black Tornado crushed the Pelicans 51 to 0 for its fifth win of the season last night. State champs last year, the Tigers are on their way toward the 1945 crown.

The Klamath eleven was game but didn't stand a chance before the Tornado's steamroller onslaught. The Pelicans had possession of the ball only six times during the entire play and until the last quarter those periods were just momentary as fumbles robbed the local boys of their only chances to make any headway.

Medford scored twice in the first period, twice again in the second, romped into pay dirt three times in the third and put across a final tally in the fourth quarter. It was not until the Tigers had put across their last touchdown that Klamath was able to make even a first down, that coming when Bob Mocabee ran back the kickoff from his own 10 to the 42. Whitl crashed over tackle for eight and Coleman passed seven yards to Thurman for the first down.

A couple of plays later Medford recovered a fumble on its 35 and brought the ball to the Klamath eight on a series of heaves by Earl Stelle. Right there the Pelican line began to hold and Klamath took over, the only time the ball was lost on downs during the game.

The Tornadoes started their scoring without much preliminary in the initial frame. Recovering a fumble on the Pelican 26, Glen Bostwick raced to the 15, Bob Watson hit the line for three and Jerry Clark repeated through center for the marker. A moment later Clark repeated his plunge for the extra point and the rout was started.

After Klamath tried a couple of line plays and a pass without making any headway, Edwards punted to the Medford 30 and the Tornado was rolling again. Bostwick ran the kick back to his own 42, Clark, Watson and Bostwick worked their way down to the Klamath 13 and Watson ripped through right guard for a touchdown.

Taking the offense on their own 23 early in the second period, Stelle, Watson and Clark ripped the Pelican line to shreds, carrying down to the shadow of the goalposts before a series of penalties set them back to the 44. Then Stelle stepped back and heaved a long pass down to Bostwick on the two and that last scored through the line on the next play.

An intercepted pass set up the last touchdown before half-time. Carr, in at half-back, whipped a long pass to Ross down on the Pelican six and a couple of plays later bulled across.

The third period was the same story. Klamath's line failed to hold the powerful Tornado runners. The visitors took a punt on their own 28 and marched 72 yards down the field without halt. Watson dashed over from the 11 without a hand being laid on him.

Medford kicked off and Bob Redkey, taking the ball on his 12, was very nearly away before he fumbled on the 43 and Medford recovered. Three plays put the oval again on the Klamath two and Ross sneaked over.

Edwards ran the next kickoff to his own 33, then Bill Tingley intercepted a Coleman pass and galloped back to the Pelican ten. Fullback Bob Watson loped over from there.

A few minutes later Medford intercepted another pass on the Klamath 35 and Watson ran down to the nine as the third quarter ended. For a moment beginning the fourth canto the Pelican line held, then Bostwick plowed through for the score. That was the final tally.

Klamath, with subs filling the backfield, made its initial first down, lost the ball on a fumble, then held on the eight to take over on downs. Mocabee, Van Meter and Thurman teamed up for another first down on two runs and a pass. Then Devore passed to Thurman for 21 yards down to their 42 before bad luck again hit.

Devore kicked out and Medford, trying for another score, took to the air. Mocabee intercepted one of Stelle's heaves and raced 43 yards down the sideline for the classiest broken-field jaunt of the evening, only to have a roughing penalty nullify the play.

Klamath never had possession of the ball inside Medford's 40-yard line. The Pels netted only 53 yards rushing and aerially all evening, compared to the Tornado's 564. The Pelicans were outplayed in every department of the game, their courage being no match for the Tigers' extra weight and experience.

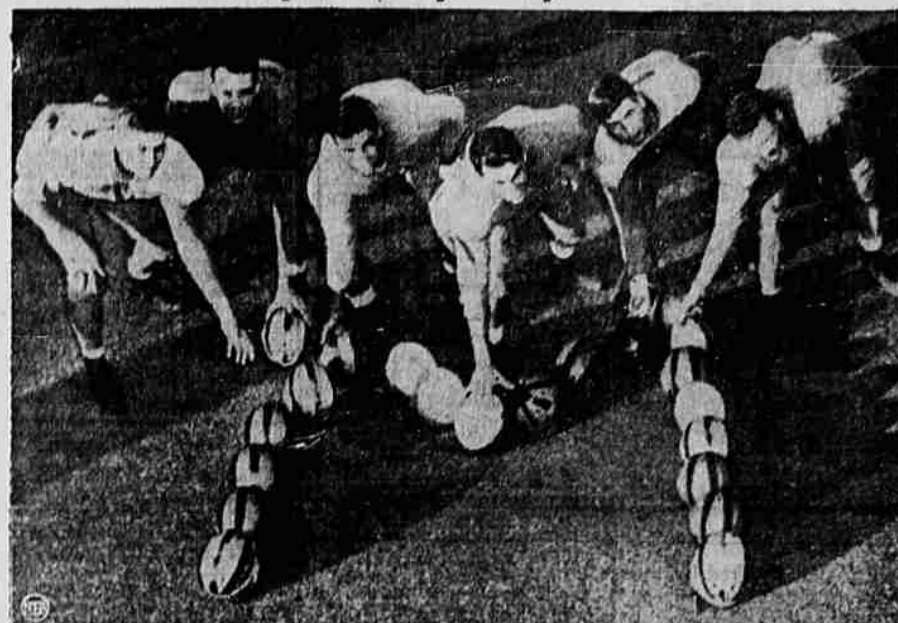
Jim and Bill Byers returned to Bend after they were unable to find housing for their families.

Albert Leads St. Mary's to Win Over UCLA Bruin

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 20 (AP)—Navy Lt. Frankie Albert, former Stanford All-American, is still a great football player.

Albert, with only one week of practice, proved that last night by leading St. Mary's Pre-Flight Airdevils to a smashing 13-6 triumph over the hard-hitting UCLA Bruins before 30,000 spectators in a rousing offensive battle in the coliseum.

Playing 55 minutes, Albert directed the Airdevil attack almost flawlessly and completed six passes out of 10 for 77 yards. His 15-yard end run set up one touchdown and a 17-yard pass paved the way for the game-winning score in the fourth quarter.

Two hard-running backs, Chuck Harrington and Ernie Johnson, gave Albert solid support. Johnson scored the first touchdown on a 10-yard smash through tackle in the first quarter, while Harrington also traveled 10 yards for the clincher. Tackle Bob Delauer booted the 13th point.

The victory was the Pre-Flighters' second in four games, while the Bruins now have won three and lost two.

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State Gridsters Casting Wary Eye Toward Medford

The Corvallis Spartans climbed a high step up the laurel tree last night, while state prep gridsters cast a disconsolate eye on the victory path of Medford's Black Tornado.

Corvallis routed its toughest rival, Eugene, 19-12 last night to take the no-name league lead and emerge as a top contestant for the southern crown of district 3. It was the first time in two years that the Eugene Axemen were defeated or scored upon in no-name play.

Woodburn, which boasts a perfect record in the same district but which plays only the small duration league schools, stayed on the undefeated slate with a 20-0 victory over Canby. Cottage Grove downed Sweet Home, 45-0, keeping its perfect record clear.

It's sad for the rest of the state to contemplate, but Medford seems headed for its second straight Oregon crown. The Black Tornado steamrollered its most bitter rival, Klamath Falls, 51-0, last night to pile up a five-game aggregate of 249 points.

Medford's high scoring record is approximated only by one school, Hood River, which downed Oregon City, 52-19, last night to remain the only undefeated contender for the district 1 title.

Pendleton, another prime district 1 eleven, collapsed to Baker, 8-0. The upset, along with LaGrande's 21-19 defeat of Mac Hi, left Baker and Pendleton tied in the Blue Mountain league.

The Dalles, defeated once by an out-of-state squad but still competing with Hood River for district 1 laurels, knocked Astoria from the unbeaten ranks, 27-13.

With Astoria out, three elevens still clutched perfect records in the northern half of district 3. Beaverton downed West Linn, 7-0, in a Tualatin-Yamhill valley league game.

Grant high of Portland overwhelmed Benson, Tech, 32-6, to remain as the only undefeated squad in the Portland league; Washington's Colonials, who dropped Commerce 26-13, hold Portland's second spot.
