

# KLAMATH FUND DRIVE CREEPS TOWARD GOAL

The 1945 Klamath Community Fund drive is slowly inching toward its goal of \$75,000, with contributions coming in steadily but slowly. Everyone is urged to remember the worthy causes financed by the fund and make their contributions generous.

Modoc Area, one of the agencies participating in the Klamath Community fund, now serves 1320 boys throughout a five county area of 40,000 square miles. Receiving less than one-half of its total operating budget from the Klamath fund, this Boy Scout council has grown to an all-time high from a membership of some 300 boys in 1942.

**Scout Executive**  
The 1946 budget of the council includes a third man to serve principally in the Klamath basin and Modoc county areas. A Scout executive now serves the entire area with an assistant executive to be located in Bend after the first of November. Due to shortage of available men, the council has been without a second professional worker since November, 1944.

The Scout movement includes three programs, only one of which has operated in this area for more than two years. The program for boys 12 to 15 years of age is well known, the Cubbing program for boys 9 to 12 years of age has been growing rapidly in the last year and senior scouting will be launched on a council-wide basis as soon as professional help is available.

**Training Of Leaders**  
Funds in the Scout council budget are principally for the training of leaders, for organization of programs in new and already established Scouting communities, for travel expenses of the professional staff and for materials involved in the services rendered to more than 55 troops, packs, and senior units in the area.

One of the principle projects of the council is the summer camp at Crescent lake. Last summer the camp attracted 452 Scouts, a majority of whom were from Klamath basin communities including the city of Klamath Falls. Funds from various communities pay the salaries of camp staff members, pay operating expenses and, in fact, pay everything but the meal costs and the regular salaries of the executive staff.

The direct ratio of membership and budget is evident when results of the last three years are reviewed. The council's objective in membership for the end of this year is 1762 boys, and, although next year's estimates have not yet been made, if adequate staff is available the council should reach very close to the 2000 boy figure on a budget of \$21,000.00 over one of the most widely scattered areas in the northwest Scouting region.

## \$30,000 Apportioned To Oregon Counties

SALEM, Oct. 23 (AP)—The state department today apportioned \$30,000 to counties, the amount being 40 per cent of the amusement device tax collected during the three months ended September 30.

The other \$45,000 collected was placed in the state public assistance fund.

The apportionment to counties is based on the amounts spent by each county for old age assistance.

# REPORT SHOWS RESULTS OF X-RAY SURVEY

A report from the Klamath County Public Health association shows the results of the X-ray chest survey made in the county through the medium of the mobile X-ray unit.

Communities served were Bly, Sprague River, Malin, Bonanza, Merrill, Klamath Falls, Big Lakes and Ewauna Box company camps, Chiloquin, Fort Klamath, Gilchrist and Shevlin. In all, 3109 persons were X-rayed, and out of this number only 82 showed positive or questionable.

A total of 270 retakes were made.
