

REDS, CHINESE NEGOTIATE ON LANDING POINT

CHUNGKING, Oct. 24 (AP)—Russian and Chinese officials are negotiating whether Chinese nationalist occupation troops destined for Manchuria may land at Dalren and Port Arthur, it was learned in authoritative quarters today.

The fact that this question would have to be the subject of negotiation was considered highly significant here. (The dispatch did not elaborate on this angle).

It was reported the two governments already had agreed Chinese troops could be landed at the ports of Antung, Ying-kow and Halutao.

China's 13th and 52nd armies will be transported to Manchuria by U. S. Adm. Thomas C. Kinkaid's 7th fleet. Canton and Haiphong will be among the ports of embarkation.

Ta Kung Wan Pao, independent daily published in Chungking, said Chinese armies were proceeding to Manchuria by both land and sea as soviet forces, in accordance with provisions of a Sino-Soviet pact, withdraw from that territory.

The newspaper said Chinese units were embarking from Haiphong and Kowloon and would have a short rest at Shanghai, where they would be equipped with winter clothing.

Chinese troops under Gen. Li Wen, it added, were thrusting meanwhile, toward Manchuria along the Peiping-Hankow railroad.

RILEY TO DISCUSS RACIAL PROBLEM

PORTLAND, Oct. 24 (AP)—Mayor Earl Riley has agreed to meet with negro and white leaders once monthly to discuss problems resulting from this area's war-arrived negro populace.

The plan—a substitute for the formal civic committee urged by race relations groups—will take up employment of negroes, housing, and other peacetime problems.

First will be a conference with private and public housing leaders to mull the problem of homes for negroes who will have to move with the closure of Vanport.

EDWIN C. BERRY, SECRETARY OF PORTLAND URBAN LEAGUE, TOLD MAYOR RILEY THAT 35 PER CENT OF THE NEWCOMER NEGROES PLAN TO REMAIN HERE, AND ANOTHER 40 PER CENT MAY STAY.

He urged more employment opportunities, emphasizing that employers are not being asked to place any negro in a job for which he is not fully qualified. "In fact, we believe it is a vicious kind of discrimination to accept lower standards for negroes than for general applicants," he said.

KLAMATH FALLS MAN GIVEN BRONZE STAR

OKINAWA—Award of the Bronze Star to Edmund T. Burton of Klamath Falls, for participation in the Ryukyus campaign against Japan, was announced today by headquarters of the eighth air force service command.

Cpl. Burton, an aircraft woodworker with the 1st AAF depot unit of the eighth air force, is a veteran of three years of military service. Before coming to Okinawa in the early phase of the bloody campaign, Cpl. Burton was stationed in the Hawaiian Islands.

Cpl. Burton is a graduate of Keno high school where he starred in football for three

years. Before entering the army at Portland in August of 1942, Cpl. Burton farmed with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Clayton E. Burton of box 300, route 3, Klamath Falls.

With "mission accomplished," Cpl. Burton looks forward to the days of demobilization and a reunion with farm and family in Oregon's typhoonless hills.

Canaday Named Douglas County DA

SALEM, Oct. 24 (AP)—H. A. Canaday, Roseburg, who has been serving as district attorney pro tem for Douglas county while District Attorney J. V. Long was in the armed forces, was appointed today by Governor Earl Snell to serve as district attorney for the county.

Long, recently discharged, returned home and resigned. Canaday will serve until the general election in November, 1946.

Death Takes Husband Of Trunk Slayer

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 24 (AP)—Dr. William C. Judd, 62, whose wife, Winnie Ruth Judd, is serving a life sentence in Arizona for the trunk murders of two nurses in 1931, died in the National Military home, Sawtelle, last night.

He was admitted to the hospital October 19, suffering from a lingering disease.

Mrs. Judd was convicted of slaying and dismembering Hedwig Samuelson and Agnes Leroi, nurses with whom she had lived

and worked. Their bodies were sent in a trunk from Phoenix, Ariz., to Los Angeles.
