**New Shortage Of Teachers Foreseen**

SALEM, Oct. 24 (AP)—A new shortage of teachers in Oregon public schools was foreseen today by Rex Putnam, state superintendent of public instruction. He said that many teachers plan to resign soon, either to return to their former homes in other parts of the country, or because their husbands are getting home from the war.

He feared that many resignations might occur before many teachers return from the armed forces.

He said that of the 8000 public school teachers in the state, about 1300 have emergency certificates.
