CHICAGO, Oct. 25 (AP)—Substantial government oats purchases at Minneapolis, strong cash demand for all grains, and strength of rye at Winnipeg combined to push grain futures upward today. Oats and rye were the biggest gainers. Some of the oats buying was considered removal of hedges against purchases of 700,000 bushels of cash oats by the government yesterday in the northwest, bringing total two-day purchases there to 1,182,000 bushels. Wheat closed 1/4 to 1/2 higher than the previous closing. December, \$1.17 1/2-1/4; corn was up 1/4 to 1/2; December, \$1.18 1/2-1/4; oats were 1/4 to 1/2 up; December, 62 1/2-1/4; rye was ahead 1/4 to 1/2; higher; December, \$1.17 1/2-1/4.
