

BEVIN WARNS EUROPE MAY BE HIT BY FAMINE

LONDON, Oct. 26 (AP)—Foreign Secretary Bevin declared in a house of commons debate today that hunger and privation in Europe may bring "a further prolific human loss more devastating than the gun or the atomic bomb."

Warning of the danger of a "terrible epidemic" this winter in Europe, Bevin commented that if the United States congress failed to grant the additional \$1,600,000,000 fund for the United Nations relief and rehabilitation administration "UNRRA" will be broke and the situation we will have to face in a few weeks' time will be disastrous."

Subject of Debate
He said, however, he could not discuss UNRRA further because the appropriation was the subject of debate in congress.

Bevin said conditions in devastated Europe resulted from a policy Hitler imposed. When the nazis discovered they could not win the war, Bevin said they decided to leave Europe in a state of "complete anarchy."

"We had studied the situation for months and when we saw what had happened, we had to alter all our plans and redevise the system" Bevin continued.

He described the Germany left by Hitler as a "country with no organization at all."

He said Great Britain alone could do "very little" to relieve conditions in Europe.

Britains Balk
Although everything was being done to feed the people in the British occupation zone, Bevin said it had to be "balanced against the resistance of our people to the cutting of their supplies."

He said grain was being burned in the Argentine because of the lack of oil and that it would be common sense to send oil to Argentina in return for the grain "but there again politics intervenes."

"More wheat must be supplied if a disaster is to be avoided this year," the stocky foreign secretary added.

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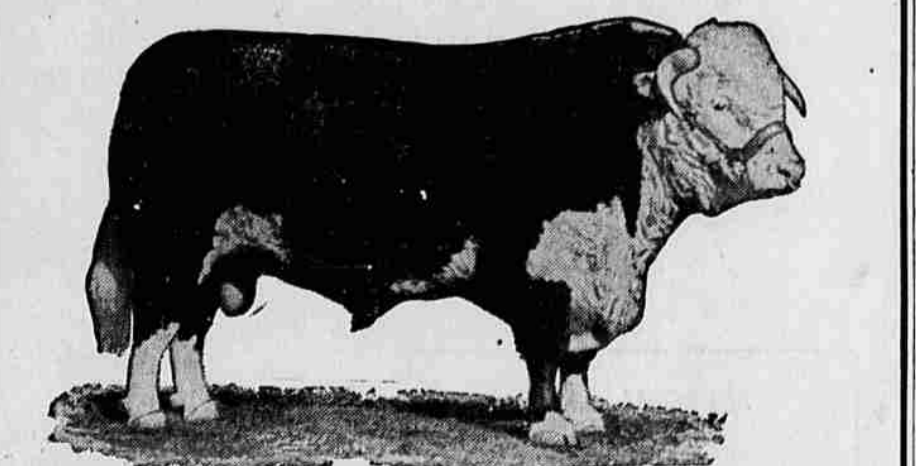

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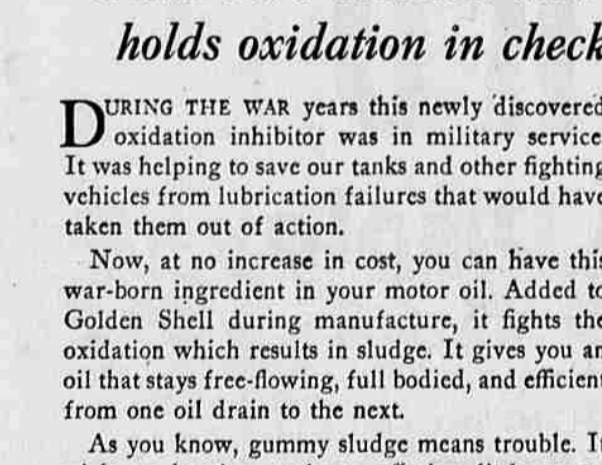
