Jan Peerce Sings Wednesday Night

Despite a long delay which postponed Jan Peerce's concert here Wednesday evening by almost two hours, he was greeted by an enthusiastic audience at the Pelican when the first of the 1945-46 winter series was given for the pleasure of members of the Klamath Community Concert association.

Before he sang his final encore, Mr. Peerce complimented the Klamath audience on his reception despite the long wait and he was especially gracious in singing his encores.

Jan Peerce, who is considered one of the nation's outstanding tenors, was heard by many the previous Friday when he sang with the San Francisco Opera company along with Lily Pons. They were not disappointed in his appearance here and he chose seven encores, not including the encores, which ranged from Handel and Schubert to the modern composers. One of his encores was "Old Mother Hubbard" sung in the style of Handel, this and the aria from "Pagliacci," appealing strongly to an audience which had looked forward to hearing Jan Peerce.

A number of listeners expressed disappointment in that Warner Bass, Mr. Peerce's accompanist, did not play a group of solo numbers. His sympathetic accompaniment was greatly appreciated and in his own right he appeared a fine artist. Both Mr. Peerce, who fittingly opened his program with a request that the audience sing with him "The Star Spangled Banner," and Mr. Bass, are to be complimented for their graciousness appearing as they did, one might say, under duress. The famous Peerce ringing tenor found many new fans among his Klamath audience last Wednesday night.
