

# Huskies Take Over Coast Conference Lead

## Wedemeyer And Freshman Gaels Have Eye On Some Bowl Invitation

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 29 (AP)—The big question on far western football fans' lips will be answered this week—namely, are the St. Mary's Gaels definitely of big league calibre? The undefeated Gaels, paced by Hawaiian-born Herman Wedemeyer, his halfback running mate Charles Cordeiro, also from Hawaii, and a seven-player (count 'em) freshman line, hook up with the coast conference title-defending Southern California Trojans in Los Angeles.

Probably 85,000 spectators will turn out to see whether Jimmy Phelan's young Gaels, nine of the eleven starters are first year men—will hold up under the pressure of real competition. The wagering is they will. Of all the gridiron combinations paraded along the west coast this season, St. Mary's has shown the real coordination, class and football savvy.

Wedemeyer, the coast's outstanding candidate for all America, has his job cut out for him Saturday. The USC Trojans will be aiming for the dusky 168-pounder who has led the Gaels to five victories.

One was over the University of California, 20-13. Another was over the University of Nevada, 39-0. California beat Nevada, 19-6 and lost to Southern California, 13-2. Make the most of the comparison.

While Southern California was out-gaining and out-downing Washington last week, but losing 7-13, St. Mary's was idle. The Trojans will be hopped up for their meeting with the Gaels. St. Mary's, nevertheless, will line up as favorite.

The game has no conference bearing, but the Gaels have a weather eye out for an invitation to one of the out-of-state "bowl" post-season games. Pasadena's New Year's Day Rose Bowl classic is the exclusive property of the Pacific coast conference.

Two conference contests otherwise help make up the slim Saturday schedule. University of Washington, now leading the field (four wins and one defeat) through the setback to Southern California, takes on University of Oregon in the second of their home and home series.

Washington won the first one, 20-6, but Oregon undeniably has improved. This may be the day for an upset of the first water. The game will be played at Portland.

Oregon, incidentally, took a 0-12 setback from the University of California at Los Angeles last week but it was one of those heartbreakers that saw the northern eleven threaten to score three times. One fumble and two pass interceptions nullified the threats.

Washington State college, 21-0 winner over Idaho last Saturday, meets University of California's slightly misty eleven at Berkeley this weekend. Those who saw the Bears stagger to a 19-6 win over Nevada last week, visualize another conference trimming for California. Washington State has a big, rugged team that held Washington to a 6-0 victory.

Comparative scores in this instance favor California, winner over Washington by two touchdowns the latter in turn conqueror of Washington State. The answer may rest in the fact Washington is on the upgrade whereas California appears weaker than a few weeks ago.

The Sailors took the play away in the opening minutes, scoring a safety when Tackle Art Powers blocked Eddie Gallagher's punt. They struck again swiftly in the same period, topping a 30-yard drive with a short but deft touchdown pass from Quarterback Wellesley Magan to End Charles Newman.

The Grizzlies retaliated in the second period, with End Kenneth Krouse blocking a Farragut punt to give his club the ball on the Sailors' one yard line, from where Quarterback Don George bounced over.

The third period was scoreless, but Farragut opened the final stanza with a 33-yard pass play putting the ball on Montana's one. Vince Petrella lugged it over.

Then Montana lashed back with the most spectacular play of the game, a 95-yard runback of the Farragut kickoff by Harry Thompson.

The Sailors, however, came back with a winner of their own, a 34-yard scoring toss from Perkins to Bill McDonald.

## MIDDIES - NOTRE DAME NEXT

By MURRAY ROSE NEW YORK, Oct. 29 (AP)—The dizzy collective football campaign swings into the November stretch Saturday with Notre Dame opposing Navy in a contest which may find the midshipmen cast in the role of underdog for the first time this season.

A crowd of some 80,000 is expected to jam Cleveland's municipal stadium to see these two unbeaten titans clash in the big game of the week. Off the results of last Saturday's games when the Middies barely squeezed by Penn 14-7 while Notre Dame was rolling over Iowa 56-0, the Irish probably will be the choice.

Another 80,000 plus throng probably will jam Los Angeles coliseum to see the all-conquering Gaels of St. Mary's tangle with the twice-beaten Trojans of Southern California. The Gaels took last Saturday off to rest for the USC tilt while the Trojans were being surprised 13-7 by Washington's Huskies.

Other big pairings of the week match Minnesota at Michigan, Northwestern at Ohio State, Pittsburgh at Purdue, Texas at Southern Methodist, Duke at Georgia, Cornell at Columbia, Villanova at Army, and Washington at Oregon.

Minnesota, Purdue and Texas joined Southern California in the ranks of the past week's upset victims. Minnesota found itself up against a vengeful Ohio State squad and took its first kicking by a 20-7 count. Northwestern's youngsters paid no attention to the records and blasted Purdue from the list of the unbeaten and untied powers 26-14.

With about a month of the fall frolics to go, here is about the way the sectional leaders shape up:

East—Army in a class by itself followed by Navy, Penn. and the unbeaten triumvirate of Columbia, Holy Cross and Temple. The Cadets' mauled Duke 48-13 for their 14th straight victory over a two-year span and will have another soft touch in Villanova's Wildcats who were beaten 33-2 by Tennessee.

Despite their loss to Navy Penn's Quakers still stand high in the east and will let Princeton know it Saturday. Columbia breezed by Brown 27-6 and ought to get past Cornell. Holy Cross blanked Colgate 24-0 and should do about the same to the New London sub base eleven. Temple edged out Pitt 6-0 and has a docile LaFayette Leopard ahead.

South—Alabama rates as the No. 1 team of the entire south. The unbeaten Alabamians swept over Georgia 28-14 for their third Southeastern conference victory. The tide meets Kentucky Saturday and Vanderbilt the week after.

Mississippi State is the only tough one ahead of the Crimson Tide. State was idle Saturday but meets Tulane, 19-7 conquerors of Southern Methodist, next. Alabama and State meet December 1 in a game that undoubtedly will decide the Southeastern conference championship.

Although murdered by Army and the Navy, Duke's Blue Devils look like the best team in the Southern conference. The Eddie Cameron-coached team leads the conference with two victories in as many starts. North Carolina

with one victory is the only other squad with an unbeaten and untied conference record.

Virginia, an independent, has the only other perfect record in the south. The Cavaliers trampled Virginia Poly 31-13 and will take on West Virginia next.

Midwest—The Big Ten race is wide open. Indiana nosed out Tulsa 7-2 in an outside game and leads the loop with a 3-0 record. Purdue and Ohio State come next with 3-1 followed by Michigan with 2-1 and Minnesota 1-1. Michigan moved into the contention with its 19-0 win over Illinois.

In the Big Six Oklahoma and a resurgent Missouri eleven are deadlocked for the leadership at 2-0. Missouri beat Nebraska 19-0 and Oklahoma swamped Kansas State 41-13. Both teams go outside of the loop Saturday, Missouri meeting Michigan State and Oklahoma tackling Texas Christian.

The Missouri Valley conference is strictly between the Oklahoma and Tulsa. The Aggies maintained their unblemished record by defeating TCU 25-12 while Tulsa was going down to its first defeat at Indiana's hands.

Southwest—Rice's surprise party at Texas' expense snarled the Southwest conference situation. Southern Methodist leads the circuit with one victory and no defeats followed by TCU at 2-1. Texas, Rice and the Texas Aggies are next with 1-1 while Arkansas and Baylor hold 1-2 slates. Conference clashes match the Aggies against Arkansas and Texas against SMU. In non-title contests Rice plays Texas Tech and Baylor opposes Southwestern.

Rocky Mountains—Colorado and Denver are tied at 2-0 for the Big Seven lead. Denver knocked Utah State out of the ranks of the all-conquering by a 41-6 score and gave the Staters a 1-1 league record. Colorado didn't play Saturday and next week goes outside the loop to meet unbeaten New Mexico, an independent. Denver can go ahead by beating Utah.

Far West—Washington became the No. 1 nominee for Rose Bowl honors by upsetting USC. The Huskies' Pacific Coast conference record is 4-1 with USC and UCLA tied for second at 2-1.

The Uclans beat Oregon 12-0 in a Friday night game that saw Rossi make his last start for the Bruins. Rossi is being transferred to Harvard.

CHICAGO, Oct. 29 (AP)—Unless the shadow of things to come is changed radically, there'll be nothing definite about the race in the National football league until the season's final whistle blows.

Right now, three teams in the western end of the league and two in the eastern end are tied for leadership. All ten teams have been beaten, with the five leaders each listing one defeat.

The surprising Cleveland Rams, previously unbeaten, dropped a 28-14 decision to the Eagles at Philadelphia yesterday. Green Bay, beaten by Cleveland two weeks previously, handed the Chicago Cardinals a 33-14 defeat. Washington's Redskins scored a mild upset in beating New York, 24-14. Boston beat Pittsburgh, 10-6, in the day's best defensive game, while the Chicago Bears added to their growing record of defeats by losing to Detroit, 16-10. It was the Bears' fifth straight loss.
