

Pels Start Toughening For Eugene

Redkey, Hurt At Eureka, May Be Back In Lineup Against Axemen Friday

Despite yesterday afternoon's cold drizzle, the Pelicans began their preparation for the final home game of the season against Eugene next Friday with a light workout emphasizing punting, punt defense and clean, hard tackling.

All the boys appear to have come through the Logger scrap okay, with the exception of Bob Redkey, who was injured on the first play of the Eureka game. Redkey sprained his knee diving for a fumbled ball and was taken off the field.

He is able to take part in light drills now, Coach Paul Angstead said, and may be ready to go back into the Pelican backfield against Eugene.

Commenting on the Eureka game, Angstead praised the Logger fullback, Andy Knudsen, whose passing to Halfback Light Warren beat the Pels, as a fine back with plenty of power who picked his own holes in the Pelican line and didn't need much interference before him.

Selby and Eastman played great ball on the flanks for the K-men, Angstead said. There wasn't much yardage gained around the ends or over the tackle spots, and the Loggers usually concentrated their ground attack right on the center of our line.

Angstead has received conflicting opinions as to the system used by the Eugene eleven from persons who have seen them in action, but knows that they shift from a T to a sort of single-wing and box formation. Some plays are run from the T, scouts have reported.

Jones Slated For Return Go With Lipscomb

As for the remainder of the card, Herb Parks, having had his shot at the old master, the Grey Mask, and been guzzled, returns to the curtain-raiser class to begin working up again.

He takes on Gorilla Poggi, hairy-chested pulverizer from South America, who returns to the local mat wars after a tour of duty in the north end of the circuit. Poggi drew with Buck Davidson, and lost to Angelo Martinelli in his last Klamath appearance.

The other joust will probably have the Hooded Hoodlum against some opponent as yet unnamed.

PCL Chiefs Vote To Quit Draft Tie-Up

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 30 (AP)—The Associated Press learned today from a source close to the Pacific Coast league baseball picture that directors of the AA loop in their Los Angeles meeting last week voted secretly to refuse to renew the player-draft agreement with the major leagues when the contract expires at the end of this year.

The authoritative source, which cannot be disclosed, said official announcement of this step is planned within a month or so. It will leave the Coast league one of two alternatives, either to become an outlaw circuit or declare itself a third major league.

The latter alternative has been decided upon, it was stated, which will in effect give the Coast league parity with the National and American leagues and therefore prohibit the latter from drafting players from the coast. It is known that the Coast league directors have a bitter attitude toward the major leagues because of the latter's refusal to increase the player draft price above the present \$7500.

Hornsby Turns Down Milwaukee Offer

CHICAGO, Oct. 30 (AP)—Rogers Hornsby, one of the great right-handers ever to swing a bat in major league baseball, has turned down a managerial job just so he can teach boys how to play the national game.

Hornsby, who had a lifetime batting average of .358 in 28 years in the majors and minors, yesterday refused a job as general manager of the Milwaukee Brewers of the American association to continue as instructor in the Chicago Daily News' baseball school for children.

"I think I can do more with the kids in Chicago to promote baseball than I could do as a manager of a champion team like Milwaukee's Brewers," was his only comment.

Army, Navy, Notre Dame Out-Rank Football Crop

Alabama And Indiana Moving Up On Leaders In Weekly Poll

NEW YORK, Oct. 30 (AP)—Army, Notre Dame and Navy retained the first three places among the country's top 10 football teams as determined by the weekly Associated Press poll today but the remainder of the elite group underwent a thorough shakeup.

Three new clubs were admitted to membership, three others grabbed new places and only beaten Pennsylvania kept its position.

Army, playing what the cadet coaches said was the team's best game of the season, defeated Duke 48 to 13 Saturday and today did one of its best vote-getting jobs by snaring 91 first places on the 100 ballots cast.

Ten critics placed the team second and five rated it no better than third.

Notre Dame's unbeaten string and its 55 to 0 conquest of Iowa induced six voters to place the Irish first and Navy was the choice of three. Alabama garnered four first place votes and St. Mary's of California received two.

The Cadets, who have been on top since a year ago this week when Notre Dame relinquished the throne, gathered 1040 points.

Alabama, which battered Georgia by a 28 to 14 score Saturday, hopped from sixth to fourth and was followed, in order, by Indiana, Ohio State, Pennsylvania, St. Mary's of California, Oklahoma A&M and Michigan.
