

Truman Raps Congress For Late Action

 WASHINGTON, Oct. 31 (AP)—President Truman backed up some pointed criticism of Capitol Hill today with an expressed hope that congress will not recess until it acts on his legislative program.

A reporter asked him at his news conference whether he would assent to a congressional recess.

His reply was that congress, of course, had the authority to quit when it desired, but that he hoped that it would not recess until it had finished with the legislation endorsed by his administration.

Another reporter asked whether congress doesn't usually ask the president if he has other matters to communicate before taking a recess.

Brings Laugh
 The president brought a laugh when he said that he hadn't been in the White House long enough to say as to that. When the

laughter subsided, he told the reporter he didn't mean to be sarcastic.

Mr. Truman's first major break with the law-making branch appeared to be developing fast today on the issues of more liberal unemployment compensation and the administration's so-called "full employment bill."

The president's sharp criticism of two house committees in his wage-price policy address to the nation last night, based on their failure to act on these two measures, brought signs of resentment in some quarters.

Rep. Doughton (D-N. C.) (who said he was "not resentful" of the president's criticism of the ways and means committee which Doughton heads) told reporters that anytime a majority of the committee wants to reconsider the pigeon-holed jobless pay bill he will call the committee for that purpose.

He stressed also that when a majority of the house wants to consider the bill they can do so by signing a petition discharging the committee.

At the time the bill was shelved, Doughton said, the committee felt a sufficient case had not been made for it.

4 PERSONS NABBED FOR BANK ROBBERY

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 31 (AP)—Two men and two teen age girls have been arrested and are under federal indictment here charged with robbery of the Wauana, Ore., postoffice and forgery of money orders, postal authorities said today.

Postal Inspector R. I. Karr listed Virgil Cramer Lewis, 23, leader of 12 men who escaped the Multnomah county court but later recaptured; Frederick Leroy McIntyre, 26, Los Angeles, arrested yesterday in Tacoma, Wash., after a running gun battle with police; Wilma Jean Davis, 18, Los Angeles, and Dorothy Louise Wright, 19, arrested at

her home in Broken Bow, Okla. Karr said the four had forged the money orders and cashed them in several western states for about \$2000. The small Oregon postoffice was robbed July 24 of money order blanks and a money order stamp.

All four were indicted by a secret federal grand jury. The two girls will be returned to Portland for trial.

3 UNION OFFICIALS BARRED FROM U. S.

VANCOUVER, B. C., Oct. 31 (AP)—En route to attend the IWA International convention November 13, in Eugene, Ore., three union officials yesterday were refused permission by United States immigration authorities to enter the United States.

Harold Pritchett, president of the IWA British Columbia district No. 1, and two other officials, Ernie Dalskog and John McCuish, were the three involved.

This is the fifth time U. S. immigration officials have barred Pritchett.

Pritchett said that U. S. immigration authorities accused him of being a member of an "organization that believes in the overthrow of the government by force and violence."

"I stoutly denied this charge," the IWA official said, adding that he has appealed directly to the U. S. Attorney-General Tom Clark at Washington, D. C., and has filed a copy of the constitution of the labor-progressive party of which he is a member, to show it does not advocate the overthrow of the government by violence.

U. S. immigration officials here declined to comment on the case.

Hixon Chairman Of Bond Queen Contest

Marvin Hixon has been named chairman of the bond queen contest to be conducted in Klamath county as a feature of the Victory Loan campaign.

Hixon is an active member of the junior chamber of commerce. He will soon announce details of the contest and the appointment of assistants.

Kimsey predicted Oregon's export trade, especially in lumber, would soar to new highs next year, and he praised labor for its part in the war effort.
